Assistant Principal News

With April vacation now behind us, the end of the school year tasks begin to take shape for teachers, administrators and students. Much has to be completed by the time school closes in late June.

That said, the fourth grade students will be taking the state's NECAP Science Test on May 7th through the 9th. This test allows us to know the success of our science curriculum as well as student performance on both individual and group aspects of the test. Results from this test will be available in the fall.

The NWEA testing, started prior to April vacation for some students, will continue through the third week of May for those students who have not taken the spring test as yet. The NWEA test provides immediate student performance results. The staff, however, needs time to analyze the results to better understand student strengths and areas of growth.

Parents will be informed of the NWEA results from this year. A letter will be sent home showing the fall and spring test results for each child. Students in grades Kindergarten and grade one only took spring assessments in mathematics and reading so no growth comparisons are available. The information at all grade levels allows us to plan and build instruction for next year using the information the tests provide.

NURSES NOTES

Spring is here and so are the ticks! It is important to remember that most ticks do not carry disease and most tick bites do not cause serious health problems. However, the sooner ticks are removed, the less likely they are to cause disease.

To remove a tick, use fine-tipped tweezers. If you don't have tweezers, put on gloves or cover your hands with tissue paper, then use your fingers. Do not handle the tick with bare hands. Grab the tick as close to its mouth (the part that is stuck inside your skin) as you can. Gently pull the tick straight out until its mouth lets go of your skin. Do not twist. If you are unable to remove a tick, call your doctor.

After the tick has been removed, wash the area of the tick bite with a lot of warm water and soap. Be sure to wash your hands well with soap and water also.

If you develop a rash, headache, joint pain, fever, or flu-like symptoms, this could mean you have an illness related to a tick bite. If you have any of these symptoms, or symptoms of a skin infection, call your doctor.

There are some tick-removal devices that you can purchase. If you are active outdoors in areas where there are a lot of ticks, you may want to consider buying one of these devices.

Remember that ticks may be carried into the home on clothing and pets. Both should be examined carefully and any ticks that are found should be removed.



Attention 2nd, 3rd & 4th Grade Parents: Instrument Sign-ups!

The first graders have been strengthening their skills in communicating and sharing information. This includes speaking in front of others, using a loud, clear voice, listening while others are sharing, and asking appropriate questions.

Second graders got to try leaving a pretend voicemail message for a friend. They watched and shared a retell on an Arthur video. They also planned and shared their idea for a club they wished the school would

offer. All of these activities got them to think about their words and how to communicate to the audience they wish to affect.

During the first week of April, the third grade children wrote and shared a bit about their favorite family tradition. Their speeches were typed and are currently displayed on the bulletin board in my classroom. The second week, the children were asked to think about and prepare a talent for the class. The third week, we shared those talents during our Talent Show. These students have some amazing talents!

Fourth graders prepared and presented an advertisement for an archaeological expedition looking for volunteers to join the endeavor. They chose topics they felt they were experts on and gave an informational speech about their topic. They also heard a story about empathy and learned a little bit about what that word means.

In fifth grade, we spent a couple of weeks debating on different topics, such as "If you find \$100, is it yours to keep?", "Should you have to get good grades to play sports?", and "Is year-round schooling a good idea?"

Thank you so much for attending the Academic Art Fair! Everything was a great success and it is so nice to see so much support from our school!

Our fifth graders are working on monochromatic portraits right now. They are drawing themselves from observation and will paint their portraits using only one color, black and white.

**For fifth grade: One student in each tape person group was chosen through a raffle to take the tape person home. If your child was chosen please come to school and pick up the tape person for they are not allowed to be taken home on the bus. Thank you.

The fourth graders have chosen a painting by Vincent VanGogh after learning a little bit about his life. They will be coloring it with oil pastels using his very special mark making techniques.

The third graders are learning how to make tints using one Color and white to make the Color lighter. They will be using this technique in their upcoming night-time scene where the moon will look like it is glowing.

The second graders, at this time, are reviewing the color wheel by creating a Hotwheels car where the wheels are color wheels they created. They had to create their own secondary colors to complete their wheels.

The first graders are learning about the artist Jackson Pollock and doing an action painting using marbles and paint. They also just created a bird out of model magic and colorful feathers. They learned a crisscross technique to create texture in the nest.

News from the School Counselor

School Attendance and Student Success - Missing School Matters

I've been looking into how Danville's students are influenced by the time they spend at school, and the time that is lost when a student is absent from instruction. I thought I would share the information I've found in educational literature.

Research has determined that there is a direct impact on Grade 3 students when they have been "chronically absent" in grades K, 1, and 2 (Applied Survey Research, 2011). "Chronically absent" is defined as absences of **10%** or more, with absences of **5-9%** as "at-risk" for academic concerns. Students absent for **less than 5%** are not considered to be at-risk.

The research showed that chronically (10%) absent students were likely not to be performing at grade level by Grade 3. Additionally the study showed that if students entered Kindergarten with readiness skills, they lost the benefit of readiness skills when chronically absent. Students with at-risk (5-9%) absences were also impacted, but to a lesser degree. Furthermore, the academic impact continues on at the higher grades.

Routine and structure are critical components in helping Danville School to provide an outstanding academic experience for our children. Even though your child may be able to make up a portion of the work missed due to absence, essential elements are lost when the student is not present in the classroom to participate in direct instruction and group activities. Also, the transition back to the structure and routine of the school day can present a setback to your child's educational process

Fifth graders are researching the Boston Freedom Trail. Each class will develop a brochure or trading card that depicts an historical site on the trail and its historical significance. They have conducted so much research in the library this year. They will be certainly ready for Middle School and use their information literacy skills!!

Fourth Grade has completed their States research project and will create a "state box" to show the evidence of the research they have done. They have worked very hard researching their individual state and taking concise notes to help them with their evidence. I have enjoyed working with them and seeing them grow to become research ready students.

Third Graders in Mrs. Perreault and Mrs. Blais' class have completed their research and evidence for their New Hampshire project. Each student was able to create a brochure highlighting the importance of New Hampshire, its symbols, important people and completed a detailed map. These wonderful projects are displayed in the library.

Students in Mrs. Furman's class have completed their research on their favorite animal. They worked very hard taking notes and developing a short essay. Along with their essay, each student created a 3D animal habitat and presented their completed projects to the class. Look for their wonderful presentations on Vimeo!! What an amazing job they have done.

Each class continues to use an inquiry based research process by applying critical thinking skills to information and knowledge in order to construct new understandings, draw conclusions, and create new knowledge. (*AASL 2.1.1) They are learning to become 21st Century savvy students. (*Note: AASL = American School Library Information Literacy Standard)

First Graders are continuing their weekly visit with me in the Library. Each week students are read a story and we review the details in the story, describing characters, setting, or events for their understanding. First grade will begin their "American Symbols" project in the library. They will conduct their first research project and create a small book on what they have learned. I look forward to working with them and am excited to share in the projects.
