As mentioned before, we are in transition to the usage of the Common Core Standards that the majority of states have chosen to adopt. We are examining the standards and making notations when our practices and the CCSS appear to differ. The CCSS generally maintain higher standards and are stated in a manner that helps to direct how the standard could be assessed. It is good work that will continue throughout the school year. Some of the information developed will guide our usage of certain materials and determine if our chosen programs meet the CCSS expectations. Emphasis is being given to the reading, writing and math pilot programs currently in use. Much of the professional development being planned for this school year will focus on CCSS and the student expectations teachers should establish in their practices.

We all benefit from a few minutes of daily exercise in the fresh air. The focus of the month for all grades has been on speaking, listening, and being a good audience. The children have practiced raising their hands to have a turn to answer a question, politely listening to a classmate's presentation, listened to a

story and answered (or asked!) questions about what they heard, and listened to directions.

The students have also practiced speaking and presenting in front of a group of their peers. Many children struggle with this; I understand completely. I struggle with that as well. In my class, the children learn to encourage their classmates, critique without criticizing, and appreciate other's struggles. By practicing in this non-judgmental environment, the children will begin to feel more comfortable speaking in front of a group. This is a skill that will be beneficial in their middle school, high school, and college careers, not to mention in the years they will spend in the work force.

Ask your child what they did in Read Aloud...you may be surprised to hear about it!

All About Art!

Hello Danville Families,

I want to start by saying that the Original Works of Art Fundraiser was a great success! Thank you to all that participated! We will use the profits towards some very important projects this year as well as future endeavors. We have been as busy as ever in the art room of course!!

The first graders created pumpkin patches while learning about how to mix primary colors to make secondary colors. They've also been working on making three dimensional art. They've had a blast creating coil pots out of model magic and men and women figures out of clay slabs.

The second graders kicked off their fall season by making pumpkin patches out of model magic. They also learned about the Mexican holiday "Day of the Dead", and decorated skulls that displayed symmetry and pattern. Now they are working on a three dimensional clay project. Some classes have started learning about the artist Laurel Burch. They will be creating cats that follow her abstract style.

The third graders got into the fall theme by creating pumpkins and/or leaves using the Cubist style of Pablo Picasso. They used oil pastels in a progression using Analogous Colors. Presently they are working on their unit on Egypt. They are learning about the pharaoh King Tutankhamen as well as how to write in Hieroglyphics.

The fourth graders worked on creating birch trees using a very unique method. After creating the tree on white paper using masking tape, students painted over the masking tape with watercolor. Once the watercolor was dry students peeled off the tape revealing a white birch tree where they added texture on the bark using crayons. They are now working on creating percussion pods using clay. Students will be using these sound making instruments during a short lesson in Mrs. Cook's music class.

The fifth graders worked on a very complicated still life that contained a basket, gourd, pumpkin, corn husks and leaves. They used oil pastels to show the colors that they see. They rose to this challenge brilliantly and their projects are just stunning! They also designed a flag that told information about themselves. That project connects to the fifth grade power standards. Soon they will begin a three dimensional project using clay.

Just a reminder to parents that most of the artwork we do here is stored at school during the year until the student makes a Choice on the project that they wish to have in the Art Show that takes place around April.

A Message from the Counselor

Simple Ways to Support "R+R=P" (Part 3) PRIDE

Pride is the last element of our school's behavioral "equation". It is the rewarding feeling students get for showing respect and responsibility, which are the standards we have set here at Danville Elementary. Our mascot, the Danville Hawke, soars with pride as well when students achieve those standards.

Pride can be a unifying force in a group of people, such as when a team achieves a difficult challenge or lives up to its high standards. At Danville, it works to bring us together to achieve school success.

On a more individual level, when we achieve a goal, we feel good about ourselves. Our self-respect and feelings of worth are boosted. These feelings are key to any student's academic and personal success – now and later in their lives.

One way parents can support this feeling is modeling times when they themselves feel pride, For example, you might say to your child: "I am proud of (name some abilities) and will work hard to maintain them." You can also to make a special note of it when your child is feeling positive about achieving a personal goal.

Teach your child that pride is greater when we have had to work hard for something, as this makes the achievement more worthwhile. If your child works hard to achieve a goal, take the time to point out how pride you are, and celebrate the moment.

Ask your child about the ways our school is celebrating their behavioral achievements with the help of the Danville Hawke!
