Flu Shot Season Is Here!

It is still not too late to get a flu shot! The Center for Disease Control recommends that everyone over the age of 6 months have a flu shot. A vaccine is needed every year because the strain of flu is constantly changing. Since it takes about 2 weeks for antibodies to develop after receiving the vaccine, now is the time to get vaccinated. New Hampshire has already recorded its first cases of influenza.

The Health Office at Danville Elementary School has coupons for free flu shots at ConvenientMD, an urgent care center located in Windham, just off Exit 3. They are open 7 days a week from 9 am to 9 pm. HOME ENVIRONMENTS THAT SUPPORT ACHIEVEMENT Louise Janelle, School Counselor

USE MODERATION

Either too much celebration or disapproval can lead to problems. Your child may start believing that you love him when he succeeds and criticize him when he doesn't. This attitude may encourage perfectionism. Recognize your child's <u>improvements</u>, not just his successes.

BE POSITIVE

Be especially positive in your comments about school and your child's teachers. Listen to your child's complaints about school, and then encourage her to see the other point of view. If there appears to be a problem that requires your involvement, make a phone call to the teacher the next day or set up a conference. However, do not allow your child to believe that you will side with her against the teacher. This may cause changes in the quality of the interaction between teacher and child.

AGREE ON AND COMMUNICATE EXPECTATIONS

It is important for your child to get the same clear message. Parents need to agree on what is expected of your child's academic performance. Make sure you discuss this in private and not in front of the child. Talk to your child about his strengths and limitations. Refer to limitations as "things you are working on", not "things you are bad at."

LET THE LEARNER STRUGGLE

Your child develops feelings of confidence and competence when she is able to overcome obstacles on her own. If you rush to assist, instruct, or direct whenever things get difficult, you are sending a negative message. This doesn't mean you should abandon your child to go alone finding her way through a difficult task. Instead, provide support and encouragement.-"I know you can figure it out."

All About Art

Dear Danville Families,

Thank you so much for all of you that supported the arts and ordered something from the Original Works of Art Fundraiser! We have raised a great deal of money to support the many specialty art projects done here at school. Orders will be sent home the first week of December.

I have spoken to your children regarding the National Reflections Contest being run by the PTA. I have sent home paperwork for all students interested. The theme this year is "Believe, Dream, Inspire". There are six categories: Visual Art, Music Composition, Literature, Dance Choreography, Film Production, and Photography. If your child is interested in participating, please read the paperwork carefully. This is something they do at home with minimal to no help. If your child is missing any papers they need you can find rules and entry forms on the NH PTA Reflections website: PTA.org/reflections. Contest registration and entries can be turned in to me any time between now and Nov. 22nd. For details contact Sarah Scanlan recordingsecretary@danvillepta.org. We had many students from Danville participate last year and it would be wonderful to see even more this year!!

So what's been going on in the art classroom you ask??

The **First Graders** have been learning about the <u>Color Wheel</u>. They learned about the <u>Primary Colors</u> and the Secondary Colors. They used the Primary Colors to mix their very own Secondary Colors and used them in a Scarecrow painting! These students are also learning about the difference <u>between two</u> <u>dimensional and three dimensional art</u>. They created a three dimensional fish out of model magic <u>clay</u> using the <u>pinch pot</u> method!

The **Second Graders** learned about the <u>Mexican Holiday</u> "The Day of the Dead". This is a holiday celebrated in Mexico in November that honors the loved ones and ancestors in their lives that have passed away. The symbol for that holiday is a skull for the children and adults indulge in chocolate skulls in celebration of that day. Students learned about <u>symmetry and pattern</u> when creating their skull pictures along with properly using glitter to give their skull that extra sparkle! They are now learning about the artist <u>Henri Matisse</u> and his famous artwork "<u>Beasts of the Sea</u>". They've learned the difference between <u>Geometric and Organic Shapes</u> and are using both types of shapes in a collage.

The **Third Graders** created their own <u>observational pumpkin drawing</u> while properly making the curved lines to show <u>texture</u>. They looked at fake and real leaves to observe their <u>symmetrical shape</u> and drew a number of them making sure to add the veins inside each leaf. They then <u>reviewed</u> <u>Secondary Colors</u> and mixed Primary Colored paints to create orange for their pumpkin and green and violet for their leaves. They are now learning about <u>Native American Warrior and Medicine Shields</u>. They a creating a shield of their own adding Native American <u>symbols</u> learned in class.

The **Fourth Graders** finished up a fall themed project of leaves. They drew a number of <u>symmetrical</u> leaves free handed and added the veins. They used a great deal of control to outline the leaves with black glue. Last, they used a <u>wet-on-wet water coloring technique</u> to add either <u>warm colors or cool</u> <u>colors</u> to their leaves. Presently, they are learning about the universal instrument, the <u>Rattle</u> or also

referred to as <u>Percussive Pod.</u> They are using clay to create their own percussive pod and are learning how to <u>roll a slab</u>, press <u>texture</u> into the clay, and how to use <u>scoring and slipping</u> to seal the clay. The **Fifth Graders** finished creating a seasonal <u>tree landscape</u> using <u>modeling clay</u>. They were taught how to build the tree using <u>clay tools</u>. They were required to show evidence of what season it was in their picture and any details needed to be done with clay. Presently students are learning about the <u>artist Andy Warhol</u> and his style of art called <u>Pop Art</u>. They are also learning about <u>Monochromatic</u> Paintings. They have been practicing making <u>tints and shades</u> using tempera paint.

The first and second graders have impressed me with their excellent attention when listening to stories! In the past month, we have been learning about why we talk, and the importance of listening to each other. We have practiced these skills as the children tell their own stories while their peers listen thoughtfully without interrupting.

Third graders have been presenting their thoughts and ideas to the class without even realizing it! We accomplished this by informally discussing what we noticed about money (a favorite subject!) We also found a little time to make Frankenstein sun catchers!

Fourth grade students have jumped right in and have begun to present skits, retells and persuasive speeches! I was amazed to hear all of the interesting traits family pets have when your students presented them for nomination into the Dube All American Animal Hall of Fame!

Fifth graders have delved into Wonder, the story of August Pullman. Born with a physical deformity, August finds himself attending school for the very first time as a fifth grader in middle school. Your students have shown great empathy and compassion for this character and his family. I believe this story will stay with them for a long time, and someday, when they meet an "August", they will treat him/her with respect, sensitivity, and admiration.



Lady Bug Book Award

Each year, the **Center for the Book at the New Hampshire State Library** runs a state wide campaign to promote literacy and honor the best in recent children's picture books in grades K-3. Selections of 10 books are read to our students by staff and community members. Students then cast their vote for the favorite picture book. The state votes are tallied and one book has the honor of being the LadyBug Picture Book of the Year. Our students will be able to enjoy these many stories during the month of November. We all look forward to this wonderful literacy activity.

<u>Scholastic Book Fair</u>

The Scholastic Book Fair will be arriving on December 5th and will be open during the Holiday Fair and during the week of December 9th. Look for the parent information coming your way soon!

Information Literacy is the:

Ability to define problems in terms of their information needs, and to apply a systematic approach to search, locate, apply, and synthesize the information and evaluate the entire process in terms of effectiveness and efficiency. (AASL)

Students of the Danville Elementary School have begun their classes in the media center and are perfecting their inquiry and research skills.

Fifth graders are using all their literacy skills to research Colonial America. It is wonderful to see how well they have used their inquiry and note taking skills to find all the right information.

Fourth graders are completing their Genre project; students are reading one of each of the five genres we studied in class and providing evidence of their knowledge. We are practicing note-taking and writing citations. Using an informational text from TrueFlix on the Constitution, we are reading together to find the answers to the questions they had generated.

Second and Third graders continue to meet in the media center each week. We have been reviewing book parts. They are doing a great job. We will soon begin looking at how to navigate the fiction and non-fiction sections of the library.
