Why Is Bicycle Safety So Important?

Bike riding is a lot of fun, but accidents happen. The safest way to use your bike is for transportation, not play. Every year, about 300,000 kids go to the emergency department because of bike injuries, and at least 10,000 kids have injuries that require a few days in the hospital. Some of these injuries are so serious that children die, usually from head injuries.

A head injury can mean brain injury. That is why it is so important to **wear your bike helmet**. A helmet will provide some protection for your face, head, and brain in the event of an injury. Bike helmets are so important that the U.S. government has created safety standards for them. Your helmet should have a sticker that says it meets standards set by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). Wear a bike helmet **EVERY TIME YOU RIDE**, even if you are going for a short ride.

Your bike helmet should fit you properly. You do not want it too small or too big. Never wear a hat under your bike helmet. If you are unsure if your helmet fits you well, ask someone at a bike store.

Once you have the right helmet, you need to wear it the right way so it will protect you. It should be worn level and cover your forehead. Do not tip it back so your forehead is showing. **The straps should always be fastened.** Make sure the straps are adjusted so they are snug enough that you cannot pull or twist the helmet around on your head.

Take care of your bike helmet and do not throw it around. That could damage the helmet and it will not protect you as well when you really need it.

Counselor's Corner

Classroom Guidance Topic: Problem Solving

Grades 1-5 have been hard at work learning about the Problem Solving Steps. Along with the Calm Down Steps, students have been able to use their calm down strategies and then follow and apply the four Problem Solving Steps. Together, students have been able to learn about these steps through videos and stories, as well as sharing problems that they have experienced. Students have been doing a FANTASTIC JOB applying these skills in their classrooms, at lunch and at recess. The goal of these lessons are to reduce student impulse behaviors and improve social interactions with peers. These lessons are designed to build on students' ability to handle conflicts and keep their amygdala calm, so they can do good thinking to solve their problem(s).

Problem Solving Steps:

S: Say the problem without using blaming words (*"always," "never," "because of you,"* etc.)

T: Think of solutions that are safe and respectful

E: Explore consequences – what could happen if...

P: Pick the best solution – make your plan

Join Band or Strings! Parents of current 2nd, 3rd or 4th grade students: If your child is interested in learning to play an instrument NEXT YEAR, they must sign up NOW! There are NO fall sign ups. (If your child is already a band/string member, they will automatically be enrolled for next year.) Current 2nd graders are eligible for violin, viola or cello. Current 3rd graders are eligible for violin, viola, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, percussion, French horn, oboe. Come to the Timberlane Performing Arts Center on ONE of the following days: Thursday May 31st at 5:00pm OR Saturday June 2nd at 8:00am OR Monday June 4th at 5:00pm Please arrive on time for an informational meeting and plan to stay for 2 hours to let your child try 3 different instruments. Rentals will be offered if you do not already have an instrument that is in good working condition. This is a free event to help students decide which instrument to play. After you have signed up, there will be three lessons, held on June 11, 12, and 13 at 4pm or 6pm. Plan on attending one lesson each day.
