With each winter comes the possibility of inclement weather that may impact our school day. If school is canceled, you will receive a phone message from Alert Solutions. Assistant Principal News Happy New Year to all! Best wishes for a happy and healthy 2015.

The new calendar year and the recent vacation will provide a fresh start for our students as we renew and expand upon many of our common practices. Safety drills will continue with a different type of drill practiced most months. This month's drill will be "Shelter in Place". This drill requires that students and staff secure themselves within the building in response to external factors that could be environmentally unhealthy or unsafe. Extreme weather conditions (tornado) or smoke from a local large fire would be two examples of conditions when we would want to secure students in an inside location that would be the safest available.

Students will continue in the new year developing their skills taking computer based assessment tests. The results of these tests, combined with authentic in-class student products, provide teaching staff with the information they need to better address student learning. In January the mid-year STAR Assessment Universal test will be administered to all students. The testing window is between January 7th through the 16th. Please make sure your child is well rested and timely with school arrival to ensure optimum testing conditions.

Students may report that they are doing more assessments using the computer. That is partially due to the upcoming Smarter Balanced statewide test. Smarter Balanced replaces the NECAP test administered in years past to students in grades three through five in the elementary schools. Smarter Balanced is a computer based test that adjusts the level of questioning according to the accuracy rate of the student's answers. It will provide a more individual profile of student achievement than the prior NECAP test. Taking computer based tests is a skill unto itself, thus the additional practice we are providing the students in order to increase their comfort level with the format. In addition to typical test questions the Smarter Balanced test will include specific "performance tasks" in both Mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA). This aspect of the test will allow students to demonstrate their problem solving and show their ability to combine a variety of skills to come up with an answer. We anticipate that the Smarter Balanced test will be administered statewide for the first time in March.

The new year will also see the continuation of our efforts supporting school wide positive behavior focused on "Respect + Responsibility = Pride", our Danville Elementary motto. Assemblies and recognitions of success will continue to support student success in all areas. The Danville Hawke visits occasionally to everyone's delight!

The Kindergarten and First Graders have been working on their painting skills. They created a ferocious lion using neutral colors recently.
