Dear Danville Families,

I hope you have heard we are proudly offering choices with our kindergarten program for next year. We will continue to offer our half day program. In addition, we are offering a full day kindergarten class. Kindergarten classes are five days a week and follow the school calendar. You must be five years old by September 30 to attend kindergarten in the fall. We have openings in our preschool program as well. You must be four years old by September 30 to attend preschool. Preschool classes run half day (mornings), Monday through Thursday. Please call the office at 382-5554 for registration information. We are happy to answer any questions you may have.

I'd like to thank you for your support with the launching of the Online Learning/Blizzard Bag assignments recently implemented by the Timberlane School District. Our first day of implementation was a success and will count as a school day, making one less day to make up in June. One thing I would like to highlight is participation is *not optional*. If a student does not do the activity on the snow day they will have 48 hours to complete the activity. Nurses Notes

This Sunday, March 9th, is the day we move our clocks ahead. The fire service also uses this day to remind families to take a moment to not only change their clocks but to make sure all smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are properly working.

When it comes to smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, NH State Fire Marshal, J. William Degnan, has these important reminders:

- * Residents are urged to have working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on each level of their homes immediately outside of sleeping areas.
- * Smoke alarms should also be placed inside bedrooms and interconnected so that if one alarm sounds then all alarms sound.
- * Smoke alarms that are 10 years or older should be replaced because they lose their effectiveness and may not alert you to a fire.
- * Every residence should have at least two exit routes cleared of storage and snow to assure that you can escape a fire.

Fire Marshal Degnan reports that the State of NH alone has had 12 lives lost so far this year due to fires and carbon monoxide. All of these tragedies are preventable. We truly appreciate your support in seeing that children and their families are kept safe.

Lady Bug Book Award

The state of New Hampshire's young readers have voted for <u>Creepy Carrots</u> by Aaron Reynolds; pictures by Peter Brown. Caldecott and Newbery Award Books



Parents, get ready to add some new titles to the bedtime reading shift: two books have been awarded the biggest prizes in children's literature. Earlier this month the American Library Association handed out its most prestigious honors, the Newbery Medal and the Caldecott Medal.

The Newbery Medal, which is given to "most distinguished contribution to American literature for children," was awarded to Kate DiCamillo's Flora & Ulysses: The Illuminated Adventures. DiCamillo previously won in 2003 for *The Tale of Despereaux*, which was adapted as an animated film in 2008; the author, who often writes about animals, was recently named the Library of Congress' National Ambassador for Young People's Literature.

The Caldecott Medal, which goes to a picture book illustrated by an American artist, was given to Locomotive, which was written and illustrated by Brian Floca. He's best known for illustrating books by Avi, a Newbery Medal awardee himself for Crispin: The Cross of Lead in 2003. (American Library Association)

Book Club

This year's book club book is *Counting on Grace* by Elizabeth Winthrop. In a 1910 Pownal, Vermont town, twelve year old Grace and her best friend Arthur must leave school and go to work as a "doffers" on their mothers' looms in the mill. Grace's mother is the best worker, fast and powerful, and Grace desperately wants to help her. But she's left handed and doffing is a right-handed job. Grace's every mistake costs her mother, and the family. She only feels capable on Sundays, when she and Arthur receive special lessons from their teacher. Together they write a secret letter to the Child Labor Board about underage children working in Pownal. A few weeks later a man with a camera shows up. It is the famous reformer Lewis Hine, undercover, collecting evidence for the Child Labor Board. Grace's brief acquaintance with Hine and the photos he takes of her are a gift that changes her sense of herself, her future, and her family's future.

Scholastic Book Fair

The Scholastic Book Fair was a great success and enjoyed by the Danville School community families. Many new books were placed in the hands of our children! The Scholastic Book Fair is an annual event to promote literacy and to raise funds for enrichment activities in the library. We often host author visits, literacy assemblies and exciting book clubs. School store


Our next school store will be open for grades 2-5 on Thursday, March 6. The school store will also be open on March 20.



All About Art

Dear Danville Families,

As usual we have been creating some pretty amazing artwork in the Art Room this past month and it is so exciting to see the student's skills progress so much since the beginning of the year!

The first graders are learning about overlapping to show depth in a picture. They are also learning about what a landscape is. They are creating a snowy mountain scene where they are overlapping their mountains to show some that are near and some that are far. They are using oil pastels for the first time to color in their artwork.

The second graders recently reviewed the color wheel. They created a Hotwheels vehicle and made the wheels of their vehicle into two color wheels. They used watercolors to mix their own secondary colors. We discussed the details of drawing a vehicle and how to show someone in the vehicle from a peripheral view.

The third graders are reviewing what a still life picture is. They are drawing by observation some of my childhood stuffed animals. They have been paying close

attention to draw what they see, not what they think the drawing should look like. They're then creating a fantasy background for the stuffed animal.

The fourth graders started a new project about tessellations. A tessellation is a pattern made up of identical shapes that must fit together without any gaps and should not overlap. They looked at some of M.C. Escher's artwork to learn about this process. The students seem excited about it and I cannot wait to see their finished products!

The fifth graders continue to work on their tape people. Some classes have at least half of the bodies completed. They have done a dynamite job using cooperation and teamwork. Shortly I will be having students bring in the costumes and props that go with their display.

We have been in school over 100 days now and I have given students an option of doing a 100 Day Art Challenge. Students that want to participate received a sheet from me stating the rules for the challenge. They are to fill in 100 small squares on the sheet with mini drawings of artwork. All squares must be different from one another. They can do it in pencil or color. They can pass their sheet into me anytime between now and March 17th. Students that participate will receive a small prize on St. Patrick's Day.

Three skills were practiced by the first graders in February. The children learned how they can convey feelings and thoughts using body language. We practiced this skill with a quick game of

charades. They also learned the difference between informal speaking and formal speaking. We discussed how we are relaxed with friends and family and speak as ideas come to mind, while we must prepare and speak more formally when presenting ideas to our classroom community. The children also worked on solving problems that went beyond simply telling the teacher.

The second graders used their imagination to create a dream garden after listening to My Garden by Kevin Henkes. They also took time to really study a photo and give an in depth description of what they saw, felt, and observed. The children practiced using their tone of voice to give important announcements.

Third graders wrote Haikus, expressed opinions, and also created and presented a weather forecast. It was interesting to hear the student's opinions of the common areas of the school; the cafeteria, the bus, and the playground.

The fourth graders presented persuasive speeches on why they believe field trips are an important part of education. They also viewed and learned about magicians and how they practice their craft.

In fifth grade, the students reflected on the story of Weslandia, in which a young boy, a loner, creates his own garden plants, games, alphabet, and world. The students fashioned their own ideas into 3D models and presented them to the class.
