Dear Danville Families,

Students in third grade have the opportunity to begin studying stringed instruments at school. In fourth grade, band instruments are offered for instruction during the school day. that make for an optimal learning environment for your child. We take classroom placement serious and consider many things to help create balanced classrooms that meet student needs. Your feedback is always helpful.

I hope you noticed our new banner at the main entrance of the school. *Give me 5* is a part of our Universal Team behavioral expectations. In order to be available for learning we must be prepared by:

- 5. Having an engaged *Brain*

Please talk to your child about the importance of being prepared for learning.

### **Assistant Principal News**

It appears that the weather is getting better and the harsh winter is behind us. It has been a long, cold, snowy journey to get to this point, but it is much welcomed!

I hope the season is enjoyable for all with increased outdoor activity. The activity level at school will continue at a brisk pace. Grade four students will be taking the NH NECAP Science test on May 18, 19 and 20<sup>th</sup>. This test is established to determine how well students understand the content and skills aligned with science curriculum standards. Results are shared early next fall.

The third benchmark STAR testing will occur in May for all students – Pre School through grade five. As mentioned in earlier newsletter articles, the STAR test is nationally normed and allows the teaching staff an opportunity to gauge each child's progress on learning standards. The computer test is adaptive to student responses and will adjust questioning to accommodate students needing more challenging questions or those needing more basic questioning. The test will allow the staff to determine student progress over the school year in areas of reading and mathematics. The results will be combined with other forms of authentic classroom assessments to determine instructional needs for the future.

In addition to assessments the students and staff will be involved with many activities that help build school culture and demonstrate the use of learned skills in various ways. SPARKS competition, orchestra performances, Speed Stacking and many other activities will all build context to learning understanding.

Enjoy the better weather and more opportunities to be outside in the fresh air.

Fourth and fifth graders had the opportunity to meet with K.M Doherty. Mr. Doherty is also a self-published author from New Hampshire, and the author of his first novel, Thomas Holland and the Prophecy of Elf haven.

Mr. Doherty has created an exciting world filled with likable characters and events. Tom is an especially interesting young character with an intelligence and courage that kids will find inspiring. The fact that Tom is an extremely smart scientist makes this trip into

another universe even more fascinating. His scientific, analytical mind has to try to make sense of things that go against everything he knows about how gravity, electricity, and other concepts.

He discussed the elements of writing and how important it is to develop characters, how to keep the reader interested using hooks, tension and suspense. Students were very engaged while visiting with Mr. Doherty.

Dear Danville Families,

I want to start by saying a huge thank you for all that attended the Academic Fair! I hope you all enjoyed the 2-D and 3-D artwork! The Tape Person Exhibit was the best yet! It was wonderful meeting so many of you and seeing so many familiar faces!

The Kindergarteners and First Graders are learning about two famous artists: Jackson Pollock and Yvonne Coomber. They are known for their similar styles of splattering paint on the canvas to show energy and movement. Students are creating a bright sunset amongst a field of flowers for their connected project.

The Second Graders learned about Gyotaku Japanese Fish Printing. They used molds of fish to create their very own fish prints. Presently, they are learning about what an architect does. They are working on an illustration of a castle after learning about the form of these massive structures.

The Third Graders learned about a famous artist named Georgia O'Keefe. She is an artist from the late 1800's that was known for her magnified flower paintings and her animal bone paintings. Students are working on a macro-flower picture. Students also learned about Analogous Colors which are colors that are close together on the Color Wheel. They've taken three analogous colored oil pastels to create a fading effect on each petal of their flower.


The Fourth Graders learned about the famous artist Pablo Picasso. He was known for his Cubist artwork. Students worked on an illustration of an acoustic guitar. They then split the guitar up into cubist shapes. They then learned about Monochromatic Painting

which is a painting using one color, black white. Students filled in each shape of their guitar with a tint or a shade of that one color. Presently, students are working on an abstract design called Zentangle. They are using different patterns of shapes and lines to create Mandalas.

The Fifth Graders just finished their Tape People for the Academic Fair. They have worked long and hard for weeks to perfect their display. Students have gotten their rubrics back that graded them on the construction, creativity and cooperation from this project. Each and every student did an amazing job! Presently, they are learning about the process of printmaking using linoleum blocks. They will each have the opportunity to carve a block into a design of their choice and create prints from it.

This month, the kindergarteners have focused on manners, perseverance, and learning about animals just waking up from a long winters sleep. The students have become thoughtful listeners and love to share their ideas by using their imaginations.

In first grade, we encouraged Spring by making construction paper Robins. The children were very excited to tell me when they'd seen a red robin in their yard. We also practiced problem solving skills and began to listen to a few stories by Robert Munsch, one of my favorite authors.

The second graders learned a lot about themselves as we read "The Treasure Tree", the story of four best friends who work together to reach a goal. Ask your child: Is he/she most like Lance the Lion, who always walks and talks like he's in charge? Or is he/she most like Honey the Golden Retriever, whose caring heart and sweet ways make everyone feel happy? Perhaps he/she is most like Chewy the Beaver, who is always prepared and constantly wants everything to be just right. I think we can agree we all have a little bit of Giggles the Otter, who adds fun and spice to every meeting of the four best friends. Can you match your child's idea of who they are most like? I did!

The third graders listened to a book called "Someday" and then wrote Someday poems of their own. Some of our students want to be astronauts, veterinarians, doctors, nurses, or artists. Others want to be athletes, singers, wrestlers, or pilots. All have big plans for their future. It's great to dream big!

The fourth graders leaned to listen to clues in a book to try to solve a mystery. They also viewed and reported on some optical illusions and then during testing weeks, played a game I created called "Danville-opoly" to help them learn a bit more about their hometown.

Fifth graders finished "Wonder" and have now heard most of "Julian's Chapter" which tries to explain Julian's attitude and bully problem. So far the students do not show much sympathy for the reasons behind Julian's unkind ways.

Join Band or Strings!

Parents of current 2nd, 3rd or 4th grade students:

If your child is interested in learning to play an instrument NEXT YEAR, they must sign up **NOW!** (IF your child is already a band/string member, they will automatically be enrolled for next year.)

2nd graders are eligible for violin, viola or cello.

3rd graders are eligible for violin, viola, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, percussion, French horn, oboe. (Sorry no piano or guitar).

Come to the Timberlane Performing Arts Center on ONE of the following days: Tuesday, June 16th at 5:00pm to 7:00pm OR Wednesday June 17th at 5:00pm to 7:00pm OR Saturday June 20th at 8:00am to 10:00am

Please arrive on time for an informational meeting and plan to stay for 2 hours to let your child try 3 different instruments and sign up. (There will be NO fall sign ups.) Rentals will be offered if you do not already have an instrument that is in good working condition.

This is a free event which helps young students decide which instrument best fits their body structure and personality. Experienced instructors will be available to help you and your child with their decision.

After you have signed up, there will be three lessons, held on June 23, 24 and 26 from 4:00 – 5:30pm OR 6:00 – 7:30pm. Plan on attending one lesson each day. The lessons are offered at a reduced rate and will give your child the information they need to begin learning songs over the summer. This is a wonderful opportunity to try a band or string instrument before you commit to an instrument. Come join the fun and enjoy beautiful music all summer long!
