Principal's Pen Dear Danville Families,

The school year began in an active, positive way. Thank you for sending your students to school prepared! Students and staff are busy learning new curriculum. It was wonderful to hear your questions, comments, and concerns at our parent information night last week. As always, we embrace the journey of school together as a team. Together we make a positive difference!

All of us have an interest in keeping our students safe. Please speak to children about keeping themselves safe while riding the bus by staying in their seats when the bus is moving. They are expected to use partner voices so as not to startle the drivers. Our next behavior roll out in November will be Bus Safety.

I have always told our students one of the most important jobs I have at school is to keep them safe. We have a school team that meets regularly with members from the Danville Police Department to analyze our systems to ensure our schools are as safe as possible. One strategy to maintain a safe school is to engage all children and adults in various drills. The most common drill is our monthly unannounced Fire Drill. When the alarm sounds, everyone exits the building and classes line up in designated locations outside the school. Attendance is taken before returning to classes. The Danville Fire Department assists us in these drills. Fire Safety month is October. We look forward to the firefighters coming to visit and remind us all of how we can be safe in our homes in the event of a fire.

October 16<sup>th</sup> in the afternoon, we'll hold our annual Evacuation Drill. In this scenario, all students and adults will leave the building at a designated time and walk to an alternative location, the Danville Community Center. This has been planned in conjunction with the Danville Fire and Police Departments. I am very appreciative of the strong working relationship we have with the Danville Fire and Police Departments.

School attendance is the most powerful way of helping a child achieve academic success. Please make every effort to have your child in school. They are not able to learn curricula specific skills if they are not present. Why does regular school attendance matter?

- Key academic concepts are covered everyday
- Time on task on a daily basis is needed to learn basic academics
- The need to learn to read well to be able to learn other subjects
- One missed day of school equals as many as three days of catch up for a child to learn all the missed information and skills
- The habit of going to school is like learning to go to work it's a child's job

School attendance lays the foundation for whether children will graduate or dropout from high school.

### A Message from Nurse Sue Dear Parent/Guardian,

We are taking steps to reduce the spread of flu in Danville Elementary School. As you may know, flu can be easily spread from person to person. We want to keep the school open during flu season. **We need your help to do this!** 

We are working closely with the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human

Services Communicable Disease Control Section to monitor flu conditions and make decisions about the best steps to take concerning schools. We will keep you updated with the new information when it becomes available.

For now we are doing everything we can to keep our school functioning as usual. Here are a few things you can do to help.

- Teach your children to wash their hands often with soap and water or an alcoholbased hand rub. You can set a good example by doing this yourself.
- Teach your children not to share personal items such as drinks, food, or utensils.
- Teach your children to cover up their sneezes or cough using their elbow instead of their hand when a tissue is not available.
- Know the signs and symptoms of flu. Symptoms of flu include fever (100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater), cough, sore throat, a runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, and feeling very tired. Some people may experience vomiting and/or diarrhea.
- Keep sick children at home for at least 24 hours AFTER they no longer have fever (without use of fever reducing medications). Keeping children at home with a fever will reduce the number of people who may get infected. Any child determined to be sick at school will be sent home.

## All About Art!

Dear Danville Families,

We have been very busy in the art room getting familiar with the grade level expectations for the year. Students have been showing off their cutting, gluing, coloring, painting, drawing skills! Right now we are creating the spectacular artwork that will be offered to participate in the Original Works of Art Fundraiser! The Original Works Fundraiser allows you the opportunity to order a variety of useful items, all professionally made, featuring your child's very own artwork that was made in the art room. You will find more information about this fundraiser in your Danville Delivery on October 21<sup>st.</sup> All purchases made from this fundraiser will

be delivered to you before Winter Break so the items can also make wonderful gifts for others. Here are the projects we are working on for the fundraiser:

The Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students are working on a collage landscape with a house and trees. They are adding details to the house, sky and land using construction paper crayons.

The First Graders learned about warm colors and are creating a vibrant sunset using glitter water colors. They then added white birch trees and paid close attention to detail by adding the bark and branches.

The Second Graders learned about cityscapes and radial suns. They also reviewed the concepts of warm colors, cool colors and pattern. By putting all of these concepts together they are creating the most brilliant scenes!

The Third Graders learned about the artist Georgia O'Keefe. They created a large gerber daisy that took up the entire page similar to the style that Georgia O'Keefe used. Students learned about Analogous Colors and used oil pastels to create blended combinations of colors for their flower. They then chose a Complementary Color to watercolor the background. They are absolutely eye catching! The Fourth Graders just finished creating a Celestial Sun. They learned that the sun is a symbol of life, strength, and power. They created a radial design on the sun using patterns of lines and shapes inside the rays. They thought carefully about color choices. They came out just stunning!

The Fifth Graders are creating a lighthouse landscape. They learned about the different parts of the lighthouse, what they are used for exactly and if they are in use today. Students are using such creativity and imagination while creating their scenes.

All of this artwork will be sent home with Danville Delivery on October 28<sup>th</sup> along with the information about the fundraiser, the catalog with the products you can purchase and the order forms.

### Information Literacy Skills

"Information literacy forms the basis for lifelong learning. It is common to all disciplines, to all learning environments, and to all levels of education. It enables learners to master content and extend their investigations, become more self-directed, and assume greater control over their own learning. An information literate individual is able to:

- Determine the extent of information needed
- Access the needed information effectively and efficiently
- Evaluate information and its sources critically
- Incorporate selected information into one's knowledge base
- Use information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose
- Understand the economic, legal, and social issues surrounding the use of information, and access and use information ethically and legally"

(The American Association of School Libraries, 2015. Information Literacy Defined)

The Danville Elementary School students will come to the library often, throughout the year to begin forming those information literacy skills that will help them be successful learners in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. I believe in our students and they often surprise and teach me many things. I look forward to working with them and their teachers collaboratively, to give them the best experiences to learn those skills.

First and Second Graders will begin their information literacy skills learning how to choose *Just Right Books*. Choosing a Just Right Book is the basis of their learning. It is important to choose reading materials that students can enjoy, authentic literature as well as informational texts that they not only can read, but understand.

Third and Fourth grade have begun their lessons in the library. We have reviewed prior research and how to access and use informational text.

Third Graders will be researching and discovering the Native American and Colonial life in New Hampshire and will end with a unit on the Industrial Revolution. We are all excited to learn more about these topics and create evidence showing what they have learned.

Fourth Graders have also begun their research with me in the library. They are reviewing note taking and learning about the United States Constitution. We are building knowledge so the students can be successful researching New Hampshire Government.

**Book Club** – Book Club for fourth and fifth graders will begin soon. For our first book, we have chosen a realistic fiction title, *The One and Only Ivan*, by Katherine Applegate. This is about a gorilla, living at the Exit 8 Big Top Mall and Video Arcade. We will explore Ivan's life in his glass walled room, his interaction with Ruby, a baby elephant, and his art. We will also be looking at the informational text companion, *Ivan the Remarkable True Story of the Shopping Mall Gorilla*, also by Katherine Applegate. I look forward to a wonderful year, learning and reading with our students!
