Community Resources-

Highlight Center for Life Management or CLM as we referred to it as, has been a great partnership with Danville for several years. We thought it would be a great idea to give our families some information about CLM. Center for Life Management: Healthy emotional wellbeing is essential to children and important to their family, social and academic success. Their specialists are skilled and experienced at working with children as early as pre-school age through adolescence and their families.

They provide therapy for:

Individual - Their initial goal of therapy starts with building trust with each child and teen so that they can communicate in a safe setting and form a healing partnership. Through this partnership, they create a relationship where it is acceptable to listen, share, challenge emotions and experience difficult emotions and to attempt new, healthier ways of living. Group - Group therapy offers individuals a safe and comfortable place where they explore problems and emotional issues, gain insight into their own thoughts and behavior, and gain understanding of behaviors and offer suggestions and support to others. In addition, individuals who have a difficult time with interpersonal relationships can benefit from the social interactions that are a basic part of the group therapy experience.

Family - Families function best when there are appropriate hierarchies and boundaries. When difficulties arise between family members, family therapy can be effective in reestablishing roles, boundaries and healthy communication. Family therapy offers each family member a place to work together and gain understanding of each person's role in the family and improve communication.

Case Management- Their Targeted Case Managers assess the needs of the client and family in order to provide the most effective services. They work with outside agencies as appropriate, which may include your child's school support team, community supports, legal supports, or your child's medical care provider. They provide an effective communication bridge between your child's treatment team and outside agencies.

Medication Services- This includes evaluation, consultation, and management.

- Go to Applitrack through an online link on the school district website. www.applitrack.com/timberlane/onlineapp
- Your application will be forwarded to the SAU after your 3 references are checked.
- Next, you will receive a phone call from the SAU to set up an appointment for fingerprinting.
- It will take an estimated 6-8 weeks for processing with the NH State Police and FBI.
- Upon final approval, you will receive a phone call from a Danville School Administrator on your ability to volunteer.

Updates:

• If you have already been processed at the SAU last year, you will have a 3-year cycle to be a Designated Volunteer. New volunteers will follow the same process for fingerprinting and then fall into the 3-year cycle.

A Message from Nurse Sue:

Well, with the winter approaching we can expect to see more in the way of nosebleeds for some of our students. I wanted to review some information that you may find helpful, if your child is one who suffers from nosebleeds.

- The chief cause of anterior (the front of) nosebleeds is dry air. Anterior nosebleeds make up 90% of all nosebleeds. The bleeding usually comes from a blood vessel at the very front of the nose. A dry climate or heated indoor air irritates and dries out the nasal membranes, causing crusts that my itch and then bleed when scratched or picked. Common colds can also irritate the lining of the nose, with bleeding following repeated nose-blowing. Trauma to the nose can also trigger a nosebleed (such as a blow to the face). Nosebleeds are most common in children aged 2 to 10 years.
- Bleeding usually occurs from only one nostril. If the bleeding is heavy enough, the blood can fill up the nostril on the affected side and overflow within the nasopharynx (the area inside the nose where the two nostrils merge), spilling into the other nostril to cause bleeding from both sides. Blood can also drip down into the throat or down into the stomach (causing the student to even spit or vomit blood).
- Things that you can do to stop a nosebleed:
 - a. Remain calm.
 - b. Sit up straight.
 - c. Lean the head forward (tilting your head back will only cause the student to swallow blood).
 - d. Pinch the nostrils together with the thumb and index finger for 10 minutes.
 - e. You will want the student to avoid rubbing/ touching the nose afterwards or blowing

the nose as this might reopen the wound and cause new bleeding.

- f. If after 10 minutes of continuous pressure the nose is still bleeding you will want to seek the advice of the pediatrician or PCP. Remain with and observe your child to make sure there is 10 minutes of continuous pressure (no peeking!). If the child has repeated episodes of nosebleeds over a short period of time, feels dizzy/ light-headed, or has trouble breathing you will want to seek immediate medical attention.
- You may want to add in moisture to the air in your home with a humidifier or vaporizer (particularly in the bedrooms) which will help keep the nose from drying out and triggering more bleeding. Keeping the heat low in sleeping areas (some sources state 60-64 degrees F) will assist as cooler air will not dry out the nasal passages. Breathing moist air, such as from a shower, is very helpful. The student will want to avoid forceful noseblowing or putting their fingers into their nose to remove any crusts that have developed. Any lifting or straining should be avoided after a nosebleed. You might want to elevate your students head on 1-2 pillow while sleeping (after having had a nosebleed). Consult with your PCP about the use of antihistamines, decongestants, and medicated nasal sprays (that you may be using for cold and allergy symptoms), as they can dry mucous membranes in the nasal passages.
- Consult with your PCP or local pharmacist as to over-the-counter products that can be used to moisten the nasal passages.

Counselor's Corner Welcome Back Danville School Family and Friends!

Hello and welcome to the first 2019-2020 Counselor Corner! As we begin the school year, parents and teachers often find that some students have a difficult time transitioning back to school. We need to remember that children need time to transition into new routines. They often need reassurance that feeling nervous, scared, excited, etc. are normal feelings to newness. "New School Year Jitters" are to be expected! Below are some ways you can help them (and yourself!) get through them.

Tip: Easing the New School Year Jitters

The Fears: "I don't want to be away from you for so long!" "I don't know anyone in my class"

Anxiety wants certainty and comfort, and when it doesn't get it, it tries to find it. When you see / feel your child's anxiousness, start by acknowledging your child's concern. Acknowledge that your child is feeling nervous by saying something like "I know you're feeling nervous." It's helpful to normalize their feelings rather than try to remove them. It's normal to feel *sad* that summer is over, or to be *disappointed* that their best pal isn't in their class or they didn't get the teacher they were hoping for. It's okay to feel *uncomfortable* on the noisy bus and that it might take a few days (or weeks) to figure out where to sit. These are all normal feelings to new situations. We've all been there!

If your child had a teary goodbye, refrain from mentioning it again later. Instead, ask them to tell you about one fun thing they did



that day. Even if you were thinking about their tears, they most likely forgot them hours ago ③. Please feel free to contact your child's teacher or myself at any time, to find out how your child's day went.

I look forward to getting to know your children. It's going to be a great year!

During the first few weeks of school, your child was able to spend some quality time in the library. During this time, they were re-introduced to the library, library procedures and expectations as well as the proper way to care for books. Destiny – Electronic Card Catalog

To access Destiny, go the Danville School homepage. On the lower right-hand corner, you will see an icon for a red globe, simply drag the icon to the right and you will have access to Destiny.

Not only are students able to look up the various resources in the library, they are able to access web-based information that is safe and accurate while doing their homework. Welcome to Art at Danville! This letter will assist you in understanding the art program here at Danville.

Goals: My overall goals are to motivate students to express themselves visually and creatively through artistic thought and action while they build a foundation of art knowledge and skills through the Elements of Art and Principles of Design. The elementary art program enriches every student in so many ways! At each grade level students will:

- practice problem solving and critical thinking
- learn about history and culture
- learn to more effectively use their senses to explore the world.
- use both verbal and nonverbal methods to express abstract ideas and emotions
- learn to trust their creative intelligence.
- learn concepts and techniques that will give them control of the visual images they produce
- learn to identify aesthetic qualities in a variety of artwork and in the environment
- learn the language of visual art so that they have a precise vocabulary in which to express their ideas.

Grading: Grading will be through teacher observation, student responsibility, art production and self-response/evaluation.

Class Behavior Guidelines: To maintain a safe productive learning environment, art class guidelines have been established and reviewed in each class. Each child is expected to follow class guidelines so class time can be used for learning. **Incentives:** I will give a star for each class at the end of the class. The class can receive a gold star for excellent behavior or a green star for good behavior. This will encourage correct behavior in art class and help promote a great learning and fun environment.
