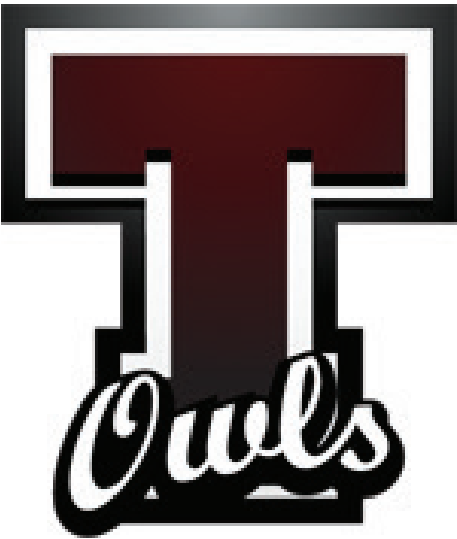

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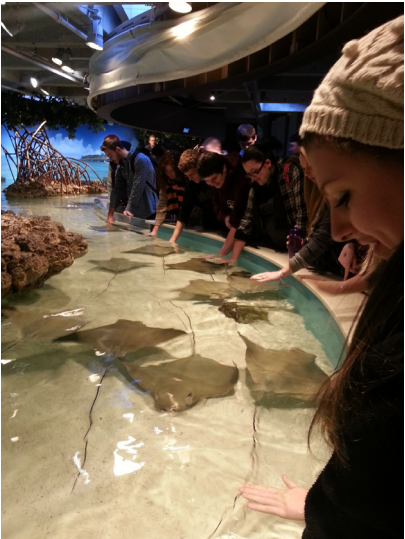
A Day with the Fishies

On December 13th, Mr. Sean Peters’ and Ms. Erica Gregson’s Oceanography and Marine Biology classes went on a field trip to the New England Aquarium. This field trip was both educational and enjoyable for the students involved.

The aquarium, for those who are not familiar, is located in Boston, Massachusetts right on the edge of the Boston Harbor. Opened on June 20, 1969 this facility has been providing information on marine life along with hundreds of different species to view up close and personal.

The centerpiece of the New England Aquarium is a four story salt water fish tank housing over 2000 marine animals. This newly renovated tank is now full of newly designed coral and other aquatic plants. This \$17.3 million renovation was completed on July 1st and the outcome is magnificent. The students were able to recognize many of the aquatic species and learn more about them as the day progressed.



“This was a pretty neat field trip, also it was very informative,” says Mike Strout, a student who took part in this field trip. Another new exhibit, which was a favorite amongst students, was the Trust Family Foundation Shark and Ray Touch Tank. This was a shallow tank full of different animals including cownose rays, Atlantic rays and epaulette sharks.

Overall this field trip was an ideal experience for all involved. With flawless participation by the students, they were able to learn countless amounts of new information along with strengthening their knowledge of the animals and habitats themselves, all while having a tremendous amount of fun.

Gregson said, “This field trip was a lot of work, but in the end it was worth it. This was not just a day out of school; it was a new experience for students to learn hands-on information about marine life.”

This field trip is one that should be taken by marine biology and oceanography for many years to come.

Going Back In Time In The Mills of Lawrence

Learning about immigrants in a classroom can be dull and boring, but what if you got to actually experience what it would be like? Actually being able to experience and see how the immigrants of Lawrence, MA lived around the year 1900. On December 6th, a group of 30 students were able to do so.

Mrs. Meaghan Guanci stated, “Mr. [James] Kelly and I took our American Studies class to help further enhance their knowledge about immigration and industry circa 1900.” Not only did the group of thirty students attend, but so did administrator, Mr. Brian O’Connell.

The group of American Studies students visited the Great Dam, where they were educated about how the canal systems of Lawrence worked to power the factories. According to Maurice B. Dorgan, the Great Dam was known as the “greatest contributing factor in developing Lawrence as one of the leading manufacturing cities of the country.”

Next, they visited St. Patrick’s Parish where Irish Catholic immigrants went to church on their only off from their 6 day work week. The church is still open to Roman Catholics and has connection with St. Patrick Elementary School and Lawrence Catholic Academy. Today, the parish offers tri-lingual services every week in English, Spanish and Vietnamese.

After visiting the cathedral, the group went to The Friends of Lawrence Heritage State Park. One aspect that Guanci especially enjoyed was “an exhibit of artwork on the Bread and Roses strike; this is an event that happens once every 27 years! We were very fortunate to be able to see this.” The opportunity was to see an exhibit full of the Paintings of Lawrence and the Bread and Roses Strike Ralph Fasanella.

The Bread and Roses strike was a period of time when factories would cut their workers’ hours down from over 50-hour work weeks, as well as cut their pay in half. The paintings by Ralph Fasanella depicted mill machinery as symbolism of the strike.

Their final stop of their trip through Lawrence was to visit an actual factory. The students were able to see some of the terrible working conditions in which people worked. The tight space and number of machines in the large factory surprised the entire group.

According to junior Samantha Coryea, her favorite part of the field trip was “going to Tripoli’s and getting pizza,” but her favorite educational portion of the trip was being able to see the old mill in order to see the working conditions.

The field trip experience was a great success and all the students were able to enjoy a little bit of culture of Lawrence. Everyone was able to face a little bit of local history and learn more about American culture in the early 1900s.

In 2011, Nelson Mandela’s health issues began when he spent time in the hospital for a respiratory infection. He continued to be hospitalized from more respiratory problems until he passed away on December 5th.

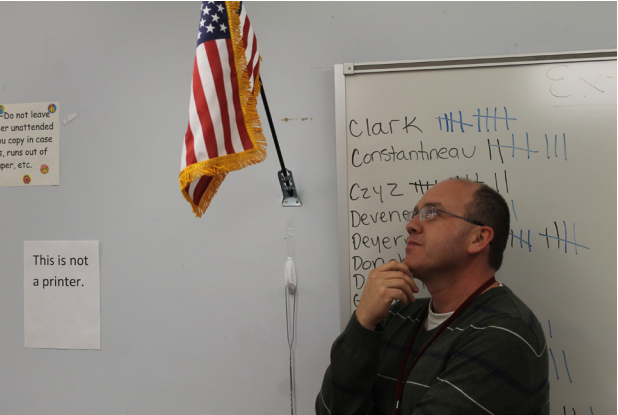

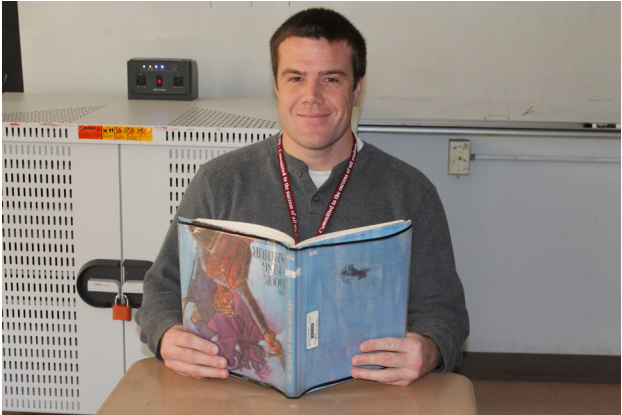

As the idea of Christmas trees spread throughout Europe, mainly in Germany, markets were created in order to provide Christmas-time goods. People could purchase presents for their families, and tools to help with the tree and Christmas dinner. Gingerbread men also were brought about, as well as ornament to decorate the trees. Decorating the tree became a large part of the holiday tradition and brought families together. One family in particular that the tradition brought joy to was the royal family. The Nature Column

If you like doughnuts, you’ll love to know that they naturally occur in nature!

However, the only downside is that these doughnuts are not sweet or delicious because they’re made out of snow. Snow doughnuts, or snow rollers, are a naturally occurring phenomenon during the cold months of winter. It is called a snow doughnut due to its shape: it is a snowball with a hole through the middle. These structures are quite rare, and it may be unlikely that you’ll ever see one. However, they do exist, and surprisingly, there can be hundreds in a single field.

Snow doughnuts typically occur on a flat surface, but they can occur on hilly areas as well. The strong winds push chunks of snow and they roll like tumbleweeds. The size of the snowball can eventually reach a diameter of 26 inches, which is about the size of a bicycle wheel. The process is rather similar to the one a child uses to make the body of a snowman. As the wind speed picks up, the center of the snow doughnut will eventually collapse, forming the doughnut hole.

The weather conditions must be extremely precise for this phenomenon to take place. Primarily, the snow on the ground must have an icy, crusty texture so that new snow can’t stick on top of this layer. In addition, there must be around another inch of wet, loose snow covering the previous layer. The temperature must be around freezing point (32 degrees Fahrenheit). Most importantly, there must be a strong wind blowing at a rate of 25 mph or greater. If all these circumstances happen to take place on a cold, winter day, then you might get to see this special treat from nature.



Christmas Through the Years

Each December, many people celebrate Christmas by giving gifts and bringing joy to others. But few know the history behind the holiday and why they wait for Santa to come down the chimney that night.

Pope Julius I created the Christian holiday, Christmas, to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. When he set the date for the holiday, the actual date of Jesus’ birth was unknown, so he decided to place the holiday on December 25th. Christmas is a time for giving gifts, decorating the tree, being with family and, of course, for children to wait for Santa Claus to come.

In the middle ages, Christmas was very different than the warm and happy Christmas of today. Family and friends would go out and have loud, raucous fun, a lot like what people do on Mardi Gras today. In fact, because of this, Christmas was banned in Boston from 1659 to 1681 and anyone who was found celebrating was fined five shillings. And although many people celebrated Christmas, it was not declared a federal holiday in the United States until 1870.

Originally, the holiday had nothing to do with Santa Claus. Initially known as Saint Nicholas, Santa Claus was celebrated on December 1st with a feast. Saint Nicholas, the patron saint of sailors and children, was said to visit children’s homes after bed and give them presents because he preferred not to be seen doing so in the day. A tradition developed that children would leave out fruit and desserts for him to eat.

The origin of his modern name, Santa Claus, came from Holland where they called him Sinter Klaas, short for Sint Nikolaas. In Washington Irving’s book, The History of New York, he referred to Sinter Klaas as St. Nicholas, the patron saint of New York. Modern Santa is seen wearing a red suit trimmed in white. This was derived from the popular poem written by Clement Moore in 1823, “A Visit from St. Nicholas”. He described Santa as a small, elfish, happy man wearing red and white and had a sleigh pulled by eight reindeer.



The company Coca Cola also helped further Santa’s appearance in their ads, because their colors are also red and white. Rudolph the reindeer was not made part of Santa’s team until 1939. Robert L. May published a book for children about a mistreated, red-nosed reindeer, Rudolph, who became a hero by lighting the way with his nose for Santa as they delivered presents on a dark and stormy Christmas Eve.

This Christmas, think about what the holiday is really about and why we celebrate it each year. Bring happiness to those around you and have fun with your family and friends. Merry Christmas!

History of Kwanzaa

Everyone seems to know Christmas traditions, whether it’s trees or a man in a red suit. But what about those who celebrate differently this time of year?

In African American culture, there is a holiday celebrated around this time of year, Kwanzaa. It was created in 1966 by Dr. Karenga to bring together the African American community. It lasts from December 26th to January 1st, and it is estimated that over 18 million people take part in the holiday.

Kwanzaa is not a religious holiday, nor is its purpose to replace Christmas. It was originally created to inspire African Americans during a time of great social change, to end racism and violence. The name comes from a phrase in Swahili, “matunda ya kwanza” which translates to “first fruits of the harvest.” This is because the holiday was formed from many of the harvest celebrations in Africa.

The traditional colors of Kwanzaa are red, black, and green. Kwanzaa has seven basic principles that come from African traditional community values:

- Umoja, meaning unity, or a community that stays together.
- Kujichagulia, meaning self-determination, speaking your voice.
- Ujima, meaning collective work and responsibility; helping others.
- Ujamaa, meaning cooperative economics, or supporting local business.
- Nia, meaning a sense of purpose.
- Kuumba, meaning a sense of creativity and making things more beautiful.
- Imani meaning faith, believing that a better world may be created.

The celebration of these old values has now been around for almost 50 years in the African American community. Though it’s a fairly newer tradition compared to most holidays, it seems to hold no less meaning to those who take part.



Origin of the Candy Cane

The tradition started when the unnamed choirmaster at the Cologne Cathedral wanted to create a way to keep children quiet during church, especially at Christmas time. In the spirit of Christmas, the choirmaster decided to go to a local candy maker to create a candy for children to enjoy during mass. He decided to make candy sticks in the shape of a cane to help the children remember the shepherds who paid a visit to baby Jesus on this very night.



The choirmaster chose to make the canes a pure white color to also teach the children. The white color was chosen to symbolize the wholesome Christian belief in a sinless life. The familiar red stripes we see were not added to the candy cane until the 20th century.

The red stripes have a variety of different interpretations. Many people believe that the bold red stripe is used to represent God’s love. The three thin red lines are thought to represent the Holy Trinity; The father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, or to show the blood spilled when Jesus was crucified.

Christians also believe the candy cane was given its shape and color for other reasons as well. Some believe that the candy cane is actually a capital J, used to signify Jesus. Others also believe that the white base color is used to signify the purity of Jesus and his virgin birth.

Although the origin of the candy cane varies, the choirmaster story is considered to be the most fact oriented. Even before the red stripes were added, the candy cane has been a part of Christmas for generations. The color and shape is still used to this day. Although many companies have changed the colors and flavors of the candy cane, the original design seems to be the most popular.

Joyeux Noël, Fröhliche Weihnachten, Merry Christmas. You may not understand what some of these expressions mean, but on one Christmas Eve in 1914 there was a universal language spoken amongst enemies; the language of peace.

Throughout the First World War, men fought each other constantly and violently in the trenches. Due to the awful conditions of the trenches, such as the mud, rats and a lack of food, their lives were miserable. The fact that they were drafted, or involuntarily sent to fight, made the war even worse. During the fighting, their hatred for each other grew, but as time went on, their discontent for the war grew as well. By December of 1914, the war had been waging for six months. What was supposed to be a relatively short confrontation was turning into a dead lock. Many soldiers remained focused on the fighting even with Christmas drawing near. However, in some sections along the Western Front the men took a different approach.

On the eve of Christmas, carols broke out in the German trenches. This led to small scale celebrations and decorations were placed around the trenches. The British forces and a fraction of the French forces responded to the Germans with carols of their own. The Christmas spirit spilled out of the trenches and filled the air. Slowly and cautiously, the soldiers from the German side emerged from their trenches to meet their British, Scottish and French enemies. While in the middle, the men exchanged gifts of food, chocolate, tobacco and alcohol. Husbands exchanged pictures of their wives and fathers showed enemy soldiers pictures of their family as the men bonded. They played soccer, traded buttons, gave haircuts and conversed through translators. Joint burial services were held and the dead, that had covered the battlefield for so long, were finally buried.



The cease-fire differed along each front. Unfortunately, war still waged along other fronts. Although the war did not end on that night, for many it was forever changed. Issues were ordered on both sides for the men to never repeat the fraternization and future friendly exchanges with the enemy were discouraged. Although the orders were clear and decisive, throughout the remainder of the war, attempts at truces were made, some ending in success.

There are not many things in the world that can stop enemies from hating one another, even for a brief period of time, but Christmas however, is one of them. This event shows the true nature of man, that he would rather befriend his enemy than be filled with hate on Christmas. There is a lesson to be learned from this event, and it is that Christmas means more than getting presents. Christmas is the time for family, friendship and forgiveness, and it would do everyone a great deal of good to follow in these heroic men’s footsteps and display the true nature of Christmas this year.

New Year’s at Times Square: The Tradition

The clock reads 11:00 and at that point, everyone’s televisions are tuned into ABC, waiting for the clock to strike midnight and the glorifying ball to drop. Everyone knows what the ball is, but the question is, where did this tradition come from?

The famous ball drop at Times Square in New York City dates all the way back to 1907, when the ball was dropped to celebrate the New Year of 1908. However, a large festival celebrating the New Year has occurred in Times Square since 1903.

In 1904, Adolph Ochs, who was the owner of the New York Times, set up a firework display on New Year’s Eve to celebrate not only the New Year, but also the new location of the New York Times. The new address was 1 Times Square. Over 200,000 people showed up to his event in the first year. Eventually it grew, and more and more people showed up. In the year 2007, Ochs decided he wanted something even bigger and better than fireworks to be displayed from the roof of his newspaper headquarters.

One of the newspaper’s chief electricians suggested creating a time ball. Hence, Adolph Ochs agreed and hired people to make a massive time ball. When finished, the first ever ball weighed 700 pounds and was lit with over 100 light bulbs. The massive ball was used for a few years after its creation.

Since then, numerous reconstructions have been made to the ball. Almost every couple years, a new ball is made, and it is made much more modern. However, no ball will ever be the same as the original time ball made by Adolph Ochs.

The original movie *Carrie* was made in 1976. It is now 37 years later and a remake of the classic has been released.

The movie is based on Stephen King’s novel, *Carrie*. It is a horror/thriller/drama about an abused and timid seventeen year-old girl who discovers that she has telekinesis. The night of her high school prom, *Carrie* is the target of a humiliating prank which pushes her to her limit, driving her towards seeking revenge.

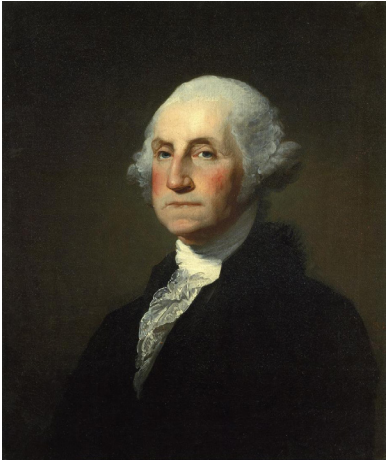
Many historical things happen throughout the year, but December has many important dates. Let’s look at some of the important events that took place in the month of December.
