

As we reached February vacation, we were already halfway through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, course selections for the 2018-2019 school year were completed, and winter sports teams were wrapping up their seasons. Students' PowerSchool accounts were updated before break with progress comments from your student's teachers and our second semester Parent-Teacher conferences are coming right up on March 15th from 4:30-7:00 pm. The district budget committee and the school board have completed their work on the proposed and default budgets for 2018-19 school year, respectively. The district will vote on those budgets on March 13<sup>th</sup> in each town. In addition, there will be important votes on warrant articles and school board and budget committee positions. Please take the time to vote. Voter decisions will have an impact on our students, our district employees and the residents of our four towns.

This year, the students at the high school have been paying close attention to important regional and national events, sharing their perspectives, and dedicating their time and their energy to make a difference. Most recently, Timberlane students have joined with SoRock and Austin House of Brentwood, NH to organize "Project 211 – One Life at a Time", which will take place at 263 Route 125 at Austin House in Brentwood. At this event Timberlane students will be among those speaking and performing to bring awareness about the dangers of addiction, and of the lives of those lost to, or impacted by, addiction. Proceeds generated through ticket sales and raffles will go towards education and prevention efforts. See page six of the newsletter for more details.

On March 14<sup>th</sup> Timberlane students will lead workshops and conduct an organized walk to the game field for a 17-minute ceremony as a tribute to the lives lost in the Parkland, FL school shooting. Already, students have been meeting, gathering as a "Junkman's Choir," and sending messages of compassion to students at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

On the horizon in April is our annual Project Hope event to support the effort to fight cancer, support local families who have a loved one fighting cancer, and to honor cancer survivors.

# School Counseling News

### Course Selections for 2018-2019

The course selection process for the 2018-2019 school year for all high school students started on January 26th. Course requests for next year were due to be entered into student's PowerSchool accounts by February 6<sup>th</sup>. Before February break, counselors met one-on-one with each student to ensure student's course selections meet their goals and graduation requirements. Parents can view their student's requests on their parent PowerSchool accounts.

### **Junior Post-Secondary Planning Seminars and Junior Parent Night**

School counselors will be meeting with all Juniors in early March to continue working with them on their post-secondary planning. Students will meet in small groups with counselors to review the college search process and learn what college search features are available to them within their Naviance program. Later, Juniors will be meet one on one with their counselors to continue the discussion regarding their personal post-secondary goals. To inform parents, **Junior Parent Information Night will be held on Monday, March 12<sup>th</sup> at 6:30pm**. The presentation will begin in the high school cafeteria and break out into small groups.

## **Junior SAT Testing**

The SAT test will be administered to <u>all j</u>uniors on March 21<sup>st</sup> at the high school as part of state testing for New Hampshire students. All juniors have been registered by the school district for this mandatory test. The test will be administered during the school day. Please ensure your student will be present.

# Flu Awareness from the TRHS Health Office

Since we are currently in the peak of the flu season, we wanted to send a reminder to everyone on actions you can take to protect yourself, your student, and others from the flu.

Flu or flu like illness is most commonly spread from person to person through coughing or sneezing (it is a respiratory illness). Although less common, flu viruses may also be spread when people touch something with the flu virus on it and then touch their mouth, eyes, or nose.

Here are some steps you can review with your student to help protect them against the flu:

- Please arrange to have your student get the flu vaccine if you have not already done so. This is the first and most important step in protecting your child against the flu. It is not too late. Flu like symptoms can still be seen up until April or May.
- A Remind your student to cover his/her nose and mouth with a tissue when they cough, sneeze, or use the bend of their arm (not their hands) if a tissue is not available.
- Remind them to wash their hands with soap and water, or an alcohol based hand rib (i.e.) Purell, several times throughout the day.
- ♦ Remind your student to avoid touching their eyes, nose and mouth. Germs are spread this way.
- ♦ Remind them to never share any objects with other students; especially water bottles, Lip balms, etc.
- ♦ Have your student get plenty of rest, exercise and eat a healthy diet.
- If they are sick with a respiratory illness or fever of 100 or greater, they must stay home from school for 24 hours.

Some of the symptoms of flu-like illness can include fever (not everyone will get a fever), cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headaches, chills, fatigue (very tired) and possible vomiting/diarrhea. If your student should experience flu-like symptoms while at school, please instruct them to visit the health office for evaluation.

People of all ages get sick with the flu; however, school age children are a high-risk group. Other groups at high risk include children younger than five years of age, especially those younger than two years, and adults 65 years or older.
