Art Department Pottery News

The Pottery Classes made presents for unsuspecting parents during the 1st semester. We've had a great semester thus far and this month our artists are finishing up on "Theme Containers with Fitted Lids" and Pairs of Tiki Mugs. Each project has a wide range of results as you can see from the "Rock" Tiki Mug made by Jordan Aquirre, a "Riddler" box by Lillianna Clark, and a "Present" by Sean Violette. Both projects, students are given guidelines to work towards. The "Theme Container" had only two requirements, they must have a visibly recognizable theme and the lid must fit. These requirements allow our artists to generate ideas and think about how they will be able to accomplish their designs based upon how well their ceramic abilities allow them to be successful. The Tiki Mugs needed to be a pair or a set. Once again, a wide variety of ideas were seen throughout the class, making a one off piece is easy; making two could be identical or two that are opposite, or two that are thematic, therein lies the goal of this assignment. School Counseling Office News

The school counseling office began the school year strong with our Freshman Orientation, College Fair, PSATs and Senior Parent Night. In addition, we had the opportunity to meet with the students in the classroom environment and individually through our office. During the classroom visits, counselors met with seniors to review the post secondary planning process including deadlines, application procedures, scholarships and Financial Aid. Juniors prepared for the PSATs and we look forward to meeting with them soon to start going over post secondary planning. Sophomores were reintroduced to Naviance, a web based program used to help them identify their personality strengths and match them with potential career opportunities. Finally, Freshmen were introduced to the "SOS Signs of Suicide" curriculum, teaching warning signs for suicide and how to ACT (Acknowledge, Care, Tell) to get help if you are worried about yourself or a friend. On October 25th, we held our second "I am College Bound - I Applied Day" where over 50 seniors took the opportunity to submit applications at **no cost** to over 130 NH schools. One of the participating students will be chosen for a \$500 scholarship through Granite Edvance and announced during Senior Scholarship Night in the Spring. In November, two sophomores were selected to be Timberlane Ambassadors at this year's HOBY Youth Leadership Program, held at St. Anselm College this spring. Students were nominated by high school staff and were narrowed down through an application and interview process before being chosen.

News from the Health Office

Since we are currently entering the peak of flu season (January/February), we wanted to send out a reminder to everyone on actions you could take to protect yourself and others from the flu.

Flu, or flu-like illness, is most commonly spread from person to person through coughing or sneezing (it is a respiratory illness). Flu viruses may also be spread when people touch something with the flu virus on it (i.e.) computer keyboards, and then touch their mouth, eyes or nose.

Steps you can review with your students:

• *** GET YOUR FLU VACCINE *** - (This is the first and most important step in protecting you against the flu. It is NOT too late. Flu like symptoms can still be seen up until April/May).

• Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, or use the bend of your arm (not your hands) if a tissue is not available.

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, or an alcohol-based hand rub (one brand is Purell).
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs are spread this way.
- If you are sick with a respiratory illness or fever of 100 or greater, STAY HOME!
- Get plenty of rest, liquids and eat a healthy diet.
- Flu-like symptoms include:
- Fever (**not everyone will get a fever**)
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Body aches
- Headaches
- Chills
- Fatigue (very tired)
- Possible vomiting and/or diarrhea

Any student with a fever of 100 or greater cannot return to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medicines. (Tylenol/acetaminophen or Advil/ibuprofen.

Any student experiencing flu-like symptoms should stay home until symptoms resolve to prevent others from getting sick.

People from all ages get sick with the flu, but school-aged children are the group with the highest rates of flu

illness. Other groups at highest risk for severe flu related illness, including being hospitalized are: children younger than 5 years of age, especially younger than 2 years, adults 65 years of age or older, pregnant women, certain medical conditions such as asthma, chronic lung disease, diabetes, long term aspirin therapy and heart disease to name a few. Therefore, helping to protect yourself will also help you protect your loved ones at home!

This national award has been adopted by 49 other states across the country. The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, district, or state in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation.

Students who earn this designation will receive the state seal on their high school diploma and a state issued award certificate. In addition, documentation of this accomplishment will be included on the student's official high school transcript, a distinction valued by prospective employers and institutions of higher education. Our State is a better place because of the rich cultural and linguistic assets of our students. This state and <u>national award program</u> allows districts to acknowledge the achievements of New Hampshire's bilingual students with an official diploma seal, an honors cord to wear at graduation and a keepsake medal or pin, and/ or award certificate. A notation is also made on the student's official transcript as a signal to future employers or to institutions of higher education.
