Student Earns National Scholarship

Recently, senior Amanda Snow was recognized by the National YoungArts Foundation, which distinguishes emerging artists ages fifteen to eighteen from across the United States. Winners are selected through a blind process conducted by an independent panel of highly accomplished artists. Amanda submitted three recordings of herself signing while playing the piano and guitar to the Popular Voice contest. National YoungArts Foundation received over 8,200 applications from across the country and Amanda was one of 700 students chosen in different categories. She was notified earlier this year of her accomplishment and was awarded a \$300 scholarship and an engraved plaque. Amanda recently performed at our Project Hope Fundraiser and was captivating as she wowed the crowd with her singing and guitar playing! Amanda has been accepted at The College of Saint Rose, Emmanuel, and Providence College and is in the process of making a decision as to where she plans to attend.

Model U.N. Does It Again

Timberlane's Model United Nations team once again brought home high honors at the annual University of Massachusetts - Lowell Model U.N. Conference. Three years running, our Model U.N. team has been presented the "Best Delegation Award" for the team's overall superior performance against the other schools in attendance from eastern Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. The conference is held over three days at the UMass Lowell Inn and Conference Center in downtown Lowell. Participating in this mock delegation provides an exciting opportunity for students to debate critical issues facing the global community, as well as develop personal skills in public speaking, researching, and writing. Not only did our team show exceptional dedication overall, many of the students received individual awards including the highest award for participants, the Best Delegate Award was presented to junior, Jaimie Bissonnette and freshmen, Nicholas Longchamp. Lillian Farah and Cameron Magner came home with Outstanding Delegate Awards, and honorable mentions belong to Taylor Gilcreast, Nya Barnette, Abigail Griffin, Kyle Duffy, and Christopher Longchamp.

Model U.N. participants are designated countries to represent during the conference; this year Timberlane students were asked to represent the views of the Unites States, Israel, Sweden, and Slovakia. Students are expected to learn about their respective nation's involvement in selected issues, develop and communicate their country's position on these issues, test their negotiation skills, and further the position of their state. This year's focus contained topics on issues such as territorial disputes in the South China Sea, the ongoing security situation in Burundi, methods to ease growing military tensions with the Russian Federation, and considering possible NATO expansion. Additionally there was much discussion and debate on the current refugee crisis coming out of Syria in particular, such as how to combat the growing health concerns among refugees and within refugee settlements, and how to best provide for the well-being of unaccompanied minor refugees. There were other topics that delved into current environmental issues and students debated establishing international recycling and waste reduction programs, and assessing the impact of environmental crime.

Math Team Makes the Number

It was a fierce fight in Division One the Tri-State Math League this year. Our students repeatedly demonstrated their mastery of content in the five categories of Number Theory, Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, and Advanced Math. Timberlane finished in sixth place overall in the division, and only nine questions separated Timberlane from the third place team Exeter. Coach Lorainne Mascioli said, "This is by far the tightest competition among Division One schools I've ever seen in the 26 years I've been at Timberlane." The last meet of the year was at Amesbury on April 5, where Timberlane brought home a third place finish. The top two scorers were juniors Brian Desjardins and Timothy LaPorte. Timberlane is poised for a very strong team next year with five returning juniors who have been consistent performers throughout the entire season.

For the 2016-2017 season, the highest scoring freshman was Nicholas Longchamp, the highest scoring sophomore was Daniel Lewis, and the highest scoring junior was Brian Desjardins. The highest scoring senior was dedicated, fouryear member Ben Longchamp. Ben was in contention for the highest scoring senior in the entire Tri-State League! His enthusiasm and hard work have been greatly appreciated by the team and coaches these last four years.

Wentworth by the Sea

The History Book Club and English Honor Society will be performing a play motivated by a Civil Rights event that took place at the exclusive hotel, Wentworth by the Sea, in 1964. Hotel owner James Barker Smith denied Emerson Reed and his wife Jane the right to dine in a public restaurant. The Reeds were black, and on July 4, 1964 they exercised their civil rights. Both school groups read *Black Like Me* by Howard Griffin and *My Mother the Cheerleader* by Robert Sharenow for Black History Month and were inspired to explore the Civil Rights movement in New Hampshire. The play was written by a New Hampshire educator as an education resource for Discover Portsmouth's Black Heritage in New Hampshire program.

The play will take place on Tuesday, May 16, at 2:45pm in the PAC Recital Hall. The History Book Club and English Honor Society look forward to sharing their performance with the Timberlane community.
