In an auditorium filled with 400 sophomores, the words spoken by Moses Adhu touched the minds and hearts of everyone who listened. Adhu opened our eyes to a world filled with war, difficult travels, and survival. His story inspired Timberlane students in World History, Literature and Studies courses who have been studying the two Sudanese Civil Wars of 1955 and 1983.

Sudan endured its first Civil War from 1955-1972 which ended with the signing of the Addis Ababa Agreement. Not too long after, the second Civil War started in 1983, leading to over twenty-thousand young boys to be displaced or orphaned throughout the country of Sudan until the war ended in 2005. Reading and researching the story of The Lost Boys is heart-breaking and almost impossible for students to comprehend, making this event even more impactful.

Moses Adhu visited Timberlane Regional High School on November 6, 2014. After a wonderful introduction from the event's coordinator, English teacher Patty Deyermond, Adhu began his presentation with some background information of his childhood. Adhu comes from a small village in South Sudan and had to travel over 2,000 miles to his refugee camp in neighboring Liberia. He became an orphan at the age of roughly 6 or 7. The lost boys did not celebrate birthdays so Moses is not actually sure how old he is.




He described the process of being an orphan and walking through the unforgiving African terrain as extremely difficult, "It was very hard, but there were others around me having a harder time. I was healthy, and I could walk. Others could not."

He found strength and his thankfulness for health. He described his cousins as being very ill for the majority of the trip. He also found strength in knowing that he was moving away from danger, but he knew that he had to keep going in order to avoid the danger. This danger came in many forms for Adhu, "We never knew what we were going to face the next day, whether it was an encounter with a Lion, a day without food or water, or fighting for our lives against human predators."

Once at the refuge, Adhu and the other Lost Boys were aided by volunteers from various organizations. He talked about how he was very grateful for their help, but it was just enough to survive. While at the camp, the Lost Boys would play games of soccer and make jokes. They were still able to find happiness among the horrible state their country and families were facing, "We were given enough food for each of us to eat and drink; just enough to survive."

Adhu not only enlightened students on the Civil War and his unimaginable experience, but he used his experience as a life lesson. He expressed his story leaving his listeners with the courage to find the strength to keep going in life when you lose hope.

Today, Adhu is doing incredibly well. Since coming to America, he has graduated from UNH with an MBA in accounting. He has also served four years in the United States Air Force and is currently considering another major to pursue. He lives happily with his wife and child and continues to work for an organization that helps other Lost Boys and girls adapt to American life style. His family in South Sudan is doing well, as he learns from frequent phone calls. Sadly, the war is still going on in that region and there are many Lost Boys and Girls still struggling. Adhu is hopeful that the war will end someday, and that there will be peace for his family and country.

"One thing I have learned from coming to America is that if you work hard; you will be successful." Adhu's goal is to inspire students to take hard moments in life and use it as determination to do better and be stronger.

The feedback from this event was extremely positive. Devermond believes that having a real life hero come and speak to the students broadens their educational experience tremendously, "Having Adhu come and speak shows a real world connection for students, and allows students to put a real face to these events they have been studying."

Moses Adhu's strength and outlook on life is one to admire. He has taken advantage of America's many opportunities and has worked to create a better life for himself. Getting to speak with Adhu was more than a privilege. Adhu inspired Timberlane students to appreciate life and never give up faith when life is at its most difficult moments.



The Deteriorating Situation in Syria

A violent civil war is taking place in the Middle Eastern country of Syria. The revolution is a continuous armed conflict that has been going on since the spring of 2011 when the Arab Spring began. The Arab Spring is a term describing the time period in 2011, when many Arab countries held large uprisings to rid themselves of oppressive governments. These uprisings in nearby countries encouraged the people of Syria to protest the government created by President Bashar al-Assad. The peaceful protests were met with violent police resistance. The people of Syria who intended to fight the government to free themselves from its oppression formed the Free Syrian Army. The Free Syrian Army was the first group to take up arms against the government.

President Bashar al-Assad gained control of Syria in 2000. Assad is a British born and raised Sunni Muslim. Assad came into power with a plan to create social and political change. This change happened during the Damascus Spring in 2001. The Damascus Spring ended when Assad's military arrested many activists who were protesting for democratic elections. Assad promised reforms to the people and talked about them frequently but never truly delivered. To the people, the government is now seen as a force of oppression.

In 2013, the Civil War saw a large-scale change. Many new groups entered the fight for Syria. The first group to join during the civil war was Islamic Front. The most well-known group to join is the Islamic State. The Islamic State or IS for short, is a jihadist group whose goal is to create a caliphate in the region. A caliphate is an Islamic empire ruled by a single leader who is highly qualified or who is a direct descendent of Muhammad. The Islamic State is known to be extremely violent and brave. They have taken and killed many American and British hostages and post videos of their gruesome murders online. The group is also highly skilled at recruiting new and young fighters. The Islamic State is now being fought over by both the Syrian government and the Free Syrian Army.

The government of Bashar al-Assad only controlled about 40 percent of Syrian territory as of the beginning of 2014. Assad's government is also under a lot of scrutiny for its human rights violations including the use of chemical weapons. There are now at least 12 groups fighting for control of

Syria. The United States is now introducing air strikes to the region to help the government of Bashar al-Assad but also to degrade and destroy the Islamic State. This civil war is constantly changing in the level of violence being used and the people using violence. In the end, only time can tell who will take control of Syria.

Endangered Species: Tigers (From Predator to Prey?)

Wild tigers have been an important part of the environment for centuries. However, in the last 100 years we have lost 97% of the population.

Tigers are found mostly throughout Asia, specifically Southeast Asia, China, Korea and Russia. They typically hunt alone, using sight and sound as their main senses. They give birth to 2 or 3 cubs every two to two and a half years, but about half of the newborns perish within two years. An individual tiger's territory is determined mostly by the availability of prey. They feed on a variety of animals including moose, deer, goats and horses. Recently their territories have been getting smaller and smaller due to deforestation and growing human populations. In addition, they face the danger of poaching and retaliatory killings. As few as 3,200 tigers remain in the wild today. This number continues to decline.

Tigers play a major role in their ecosystems which would fall apart without them. Maintaining these ecosystems means continuing the supply of fresh water, food and health for both people and animals. Tigers are at the top of the food chain, and without them there would be mayhem. They control the population of herbivores (plant eaters), consequently controlling the extent of plant populations. Tigers also help to improve the economies of nearby communities by attracting tourists. This is vital to communities who have few other opportunities for income.



With all this information, one might want to know what they can do to stop tigers from going extinct. There are many ways people can help. First, you can donate to and help out organizations such as the World Wildlife Fund which helps spread awareness and takes action in preserving the Earth. range of dreams. He hopes that the Timberlane basketball team will get a few more wins than last year. He also wants to visit NYC one more time with his best friends and,


like most seniors, have the time of his life at prom.



The Girls Who Ball



NFL In Review II

Through the first ten weeks of the 2014 NFL Season, we've seen many players and teams become big play-makers and serious contenders in the league. With seven weeks left, anything can happen. Here are a few breakout players, the hottest teams in the league, and who you should expect to see in the playoffs.

It's not easy for NFL players to break out such as QB Drew Stanton and WRs Martavis Bryant and Golden Tate have. QB Drew Stanton was the backup to Matthew Stafford in Detroit for four years prior to signing with Arizona last year. This year, starting quarterback Carson Palmer has been plagued by injuries involving his shoulder, and recent ACL tear in Arizona's win against St. Louis. Like any backup should, Stanton stepped right up to the role for weeks 2, 3, 5, and 10, winning against the Giants, 49ers, and St. Louis, and losing only once to Denver. His total quarterback rating for the season is a solid 81.6, passing for 614 yards and throwing 3 touchdowns. Normally, teams collapse when their starting quarterback goes down, but Stanton is still helping Arizona to hold the best record in the NFL with eight wins and one loss.

Last year, WR Golden Tate was with the Super Bowl champion, Seattle Seahawks, but the team lost him to the Detroit Lions in free agency with a contract worth \$31 million for 5 years. Tate never really had as good of a season as he is experiencing right now. Last year with the Seahawks, he completed 64 passes in an attempted 98 targets while only gathering 898 yards and only five touchdowns the whole season. This year with the Lions, he has caught 66 passes in an attempted 93 targets while earning 909 yards and 3 touchdowns in only 9 games. His Lions are currently 7-2.

Martavis Bryant has made quite the splash in the NFL. The Pittsburgh Steelers drafted the Clemson wide receiver in the fourth round of the 2014 draft but hadn't played a game until October 20th against the Houston Texans. When he made the start at slot receiver, he caught two passes for forty yards and a touchdown in a 30-23 win. In the next three games, he caught twelve

balls for 270 yards and five touchdowns while winning against Indianapolis, Baltimore, and losing against the New York Jets.

The 5 hottest teams (from espn.go.com/nfl/power-rankings) currently in the NFL include the New England Patriots, Arizona Cardinals, Denver Broncos, Philadelphia Eagles, and Green Bay Packers.

The New England Patriots are coming off with huge wins against Chicago and Denver, scoring over 40 points in both games. However, they are only ranked 9th in total offense and 16th in total defense. Looking forward, they have one of the hardest schedules. They face Indianapolis, Detroit, Green Bay, and San Diego.

In what is thought to be one of the hardest divisions in the league, the Arizona Cardinals are managing to hold the best record in football with eight wins and one loss. Last year, they finished 10-6, ranked 12th in total offense and 6th in total defense. Now, well ahead of everybody else in the NFC West, they rank 15th in both total offense and defense. However, their remaining schedule isn't so easy either. Their toughest upcoming games include Detroit, San Francisco, Kansas City, and Seattle twice.

Denver, as we all know, arguably has the best quarterback to ever play the game of football. Who? Peyton Manning. His Broncos rank 3rd in total offense, only behind Indianapolis and

New Orleans. In the five of their past six games, they scored 30+ points. Their upcoming schedule includes tough defensive teams such as Buffalo, Miami, and Kansas City.

A year ago, Nick Foles took the media by storm when Mike Vick became injured in week 7. He completed 27 touchdown passes and only threw two interceptions. Now, it's Nick Foles who became injured in week 10 and Mark Sanchez has the start until Foles's broken collar-

bone heals in four to six weeks. The question that's now being asked is if Sanchez can keep the team winning. The toughest teams they'll face are Green Bay and Dallas twice.

The Green Bay Packers are 2nd in the NFC North behind the Detroit Lions. They're coming off a massive win against a division rival, the Chicago Bears. Led by Aaron Rodgers, the Packers scored six touchdowns in the first half alone and shut out the Bears's offense until the 2nd half when they scored two touchdowns on them. However, the Packers are only ranked 12th in total offense and 17th in total defense. They're going to face New England, Detroit, Philadelphia, and Buffalo in the coming weeks.



In seven weeks, the NFL regular season ends. In the AFC, eleven teams have positive records and seven teams in the NFC have positive records. There's no question that Denver, New England, and Indianapolis are going to win in their division. However, the AFC North is in a free-for-all as all four teams in the division have positive records. In these next seven weeks, seven teams are going to tough

it out as only two teams can move on to the playoffs. The NFC is more predictable since only seven teams are expected to compete for a playoff spot. It's tough to say who will win each division since at least two or more teams are neck and neck. No team in the NFC South has a winning record, which is a shock to all since New Orleans, Atlanta, and Carolina are high-caliber teams. Since the season is more than halfway over, we can expect to see a lot of intense games as these teams are gearing into the playoffs.
