Chocolate Crinkle Recipe

I make these chewy, chocolate cookies every year around the holidays. They are my husband's favorite.

Ingredients:

1/2 c. vegetable oil

2 c. flour

4 sq. unsweetened chocolate, melted & cooled

2 tsp. baking powder


2 c. sugar

½ tsp. kosher salt

2 tsp. vanilla

½ c. powdered sugar 4 eggs

In a large bowl of the electric mixer, cream together the oil, melted chocolate and sugar. Beat in the eggs one at a time. Mix flour, baking powder, and salt together. Stir in dry mixture on lowest speed. Cover bowl and chill for at least 4 hrs. or overnight. Heat oven to 350. Line



Place on parchment paper about 2 inches apart. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until cookies look almost dry on the top. I sometimes press a candy cane kiss in the center of the cookie.

change her forever, something the dead girl was supposed to be included on, on her birthday, the day she died.



being an author, (she prefers to read). If she wasn't a teacher she would like to work in a museum! Also, Mrs.


Cantelli doesn't have a favorite book genre, she likes everything. In conclusion Ms. Cantelli is a really fun teacher!
