School success starts with attendance

It is important to remember that consistent attendance will greatly improve the chances your child has of being successful in an academic environment. However, we are aware that from time to time it will be necessary to keep your child home from school. Should the need occur, please take time to call the school to let us know that your student will be late or absent.

Dear Families,

Next week you will be receiving parent reports with information about how your children have performed on STAR testing. Below is information that may help with understanding what the STAR testing is, how it is used, and how to better understand the report.

What are computer-adaptive tests?

All STAR assessments are computer-adaptive tests (CATs). Computer-adaptive tests continually adjust the difficulty of each child's test by choosing each test question based on the child's previous response. If the child answers a question correctly, the difficulty level of the next item is increased. If the child misses a question, the difficulty level is decreased. CATs save testing time and spare your child the frustration of items that are too difficult and the boredom of items that are too easy.

How long does it take to complete a STAR assessment?

STAR tests are designed to be as efficient as possible. On average, students will complete the STAR Math test in about 20 minutes, the STAR Reading test in about 15 minutes, the STAR Early Literacy test in 15–20 minutes, and the STAR Reading Spanish test in about 10 minutes. However, some students may require more time.

What are STAR assessments used for?

The STAR assessments are often used to screen students for their reading and math achievement levels. STAR Reading and STAR Math™ assessments help determine reading and math achievement levels in order to offer students appropriate learning opportunities. STAR Early Literacy assessments help educators monitor students' growing literacy skills and students' progress toward becoming independent readers.

What kind of score does my child get?

For every STAR assessment, your child receives a scaled score (SS), which is based on the difficulty of the questions and the number of correct answers. Scaled scores are useful for comparing your child's performance over time and across grades. STAR Reading and STAR Math scaled scores range from 0-1400. STAR Early Literacy scaled scores range from 300-900. STAR offers educators a variety of scores and reports. Some STAR scores compare your child's performance to a specific criteria or to a standard (criterion-referenced scores). STAR reports also include scores which compare your child's performance to other students who have taken the same test (norm-referenced scores). The criterion- and norm-referenced scores are based on the scaled score.

How can I help my child prepare for a STAR assessment?

The teacher who gives the test uses pre-test instructions to explain the test to your child. It is important for you to encourage your child to try to do his or her best on the assessment. Since STAR is a general measure of student ability in math or reading, students perform best on the assessment in the same way they perform best in school—when they have had plenty of rest, attend school regularly, and have eaten.







We are excited to share with you the creation of our new Motor Lab for the 2018-2019 school year. The Motor Lab is a space that is open to all classrooms at Pollard school. Teachers are using the room a few times a week for 15 minute blocks. The Motor Lab consists of six different stations that include activities that focus on postural strength, bilateral coordination, ocular motor skills, eye-hand The activities at 5 of coordination, spatial planning, balance and motor-planning. these stations will change every month, while the 6th station (postural strength) will remain the same all year. The design of the room is based on a research based curriculum called Ready Bodies, Learning Minds. The activities that are chosen help develop the skills mentioned above (i.e. postural strength, ocular motor skills, eye-hand coordination, etc.) all of which are needed to be able to sit upright in a chair, read without losing one's place, have a clear hand dominance, form letters and numbers, write within the lines, understanding math concepts, etc. Unfortunately, due to the introduction to technology at such a young age, our country as a whole is seeing a decline in motor skills as our young children enter school. Kids are enterina school struggling to sit upright for extended periods of time. They also struggle with holding crayons, pencils and scissors. Here is a sample of some of the activities that the kids are doing in the motor lab. They can easily be done at home...ask your children to show you!

Pollard School Library has been a very busy place since school opened and promises to get even busier this fall. Our circulation statistics in September have been outstanding. Our readers are discovering new books and suggesting old favorites to one another daily. On Friday of last week we checked in 256 books and checked out another 210. The most popular books thus far, by a landslide, have been any and all of the titles in the Dog Man graphic novel series by Dav Pilkey.

Our students have celebrated Dot Day, Constitution Day, Talk Like A Pirate Day, and Banned Books Week. Grades 3 and 5 played Kahoot games to review library resources and procedures. Grade 4 is playing a BreakOut EDU game to unlock the library resources. Our Gingerbread Man has already gotten loose. First graders have met many of our school's VIP's as we chased him through the hallways. Kindergarten students have all earned their "listening ears" and are now ready to begin borrowing books.

October will kick off The Global Read Aloud at 3 grade levels, and will see many VIP's read aloud books on the 2018 Ladybug Picture Book Award list. Pollard School will participate in the Global Maker Day at the end of the month. This summer I joined the #KidsNeedMentors initiative. We were paired with author Emma Wunsch. She will work with 2nd grade students in Mrs. Bellmore and Mrs. Bloom's classrooms. We will meet her in late October via Skype and eventually she will give the children advice on their own writing.

In November Pollard School will host two authors. Elly Swartz the author of **Finding Perfect** and **Smart Cookie** will visit on November 14th and will meet with grades 4 and 5. She will do an identity project and talk about social emotional comprehension with the students. Victoria Coe will visit on November 15th. She is the author of the Fenway & Hattie series and her student presentations will focus on point of view and inferencing. Victoria will meet with grades 2, 3, and 4. Watch your child's Pollard Express for further information and order forms. Students will be able to purchase autographed copies of books by our visiting authors.

Our 4th Annual Timberlane Family Literacy Night will be held at the PAC on November 15th from 5:30-7:30. It will feature an author meet and greet and student performances on the main stage. Please plan to join us for a literate good time!

Greetings from the art room! We are off to a great start to the year! All of the artists at Pollard School are celebrating the beginning of the school year by learning about the delicious art of Wayne Thiebaud. He is an American Pop artist known for his paintings of cakes, pies, doughnuts, and gumball machines. He uses thick paint that looks like frosting, and he is known for his use of shadows. The Kindergarten students have been learning the rules and procedures in the art room, and concentrating on cutting with scissors. They have already painted adorable donuts on paper plates, and they cut the middles out themselves! First grade made wonderful gumball machine collages, and some have begun Wassily Kandinsky circle paintings. Second graders are finishing up oil pastel drawings of cakes, cupcakes, and doughnuts. They are already learning how to add shadows to their artwork! Third graders tried a new technique of layering oil pastel first, then painting and scraping some paint off to create an interesting effect. When dried, they added them to a painted background to complete some very cool doughnut collages. Some third grade classes have begun "Picasso Witch" collages. Fourth and Fifth graders are creating still-life paintings on matt board with tempera paint. I think you will be amazed at their beautiful paintings of desserts! I was inspired this summer by an idea, on a teaching website, called "the doughnut philosophy". The teacher explained to her students the quote by Oscar Wilde, "The optimist sees the doughnut; the pessimist the hole!" She encourages her students to think about the doughnuts, and not the hole, when they face a challenge. I loved the message, and it connects so well with one of my favorite artists. 
September Happenings:
