From the School Counselor



Our first graders are becoming great "detectives"! Last month we spent time looking at pictures and finding clues to help us understand how another person may be feeling. When children develop a stronger understanding of how to identify emotions, they tend to have better social skills. Looking for visual clues helps students to be more empathic as they learn to understand the situational causes of people's emotions. This month our second graders are learning about the concept of "bucket filling". We read the book, "Have You Filled A Bucket

Today?" by Carol McLoud. In the story we learn that each of us carries an invisible bucket. Our buckets get filled when we say or do kind things for others and when people are kind and thoughtful to us. However. when we aren't making good choices, we become "bucket dippers"; not only are we "dipping" into other peoples buckets but also, our bucket becomes less full. Students were reminded to start each day wondering how they can fill someone's bucket and at the end of the dav to ask themselves, "Did I fill a bucket todav?" lt's a wonderful analogy for each of us to remember.


Our third araders were treated to a wonderful performance in January from students involved with the Anti-Bullvina Committee from Hampstead Middle School. The students performed skits and songs that shared the important message "upstander". of beina an Students learned that if they see someone being bullied, help that person by standing up to the bully either by getting help from an adult or being an ally to the person being picked on. Hearing this from other students, students helps our better understand this important message. After the performance, I followed up with students in their classrooms

where we further discussed bullying and watched a video that described how students can be "upstanders" and safely take a stand against bullying.
