I hope you had a wonderful Thanksgiving and that you will enjoy this holiday season. Our students are certainly showing their excitement which puts smiles on all our faces. We keep the routines and schedules the same with just a few changes as we get closer to the break. It is important for the children to have a predictable routine for learning to continue. We can incorporate some of the holiday fun in their math and in their writing, of course, while continuing on with the teaching and learning of important skills and concepts.

As you heard at parent teacher conferences, we are administering the STAR Early Literacy or Reading, as well as STAR Math, to all of our students three times a year. They took the benchmark assessment in September and will be taking it again in January to look at growth. Our Leadership Team will be looking at the data for trends, successes, and areas of growth for us as a school. Our Target team will be looking at the information regarding students who are receiving interventions; we will determine if we are providing the intervention to maximize correct Our Professional Learning growth. Communities (PLCs) at the grade level will look at their students to determine groupings and supports needed for their individual students. The conversations are exciting; they are based on the data and the needs of our students. The information we get from STAR is valid and reliable but is one piece of

information. Classroom performance and teacher observations are critically important to the whole picture of how the student is learning. If the assessment and classroom performance do not match, we talk about it and determine the best way to gather more information. Classroom teachers will explain to you what they are seeing and get input from you as well as we all work to move our students along the growth continuum. The information we receive from the testing shows us what students know and what they are ready to learn next so we can target our instruction and practice, as well as consider our interventions. You will receive the Parent Report in January that you heard about at your conference. If you have questions or would like to discuss it further, your child's teacher is always happy to do so.

In addition to academic data, our teams look at our School-Wide Information Systems (SWIS) data to see trends, successes, and needed areas of focus for the school population as a whole and then for individual students. As you know, we take note of behaviors that interfere with learning, behaviors that we need to teach, reinforce, and acknowledge when the students are putting them into practice. The data shows us that we have a peak in minor disruptive behaviors closer to 3:00. Children are tired at that time of day and many are anticipating the bus ride. To respond to the data, Nancy Stafford, School Counselor, and Terry Kellaway, Special Educator, have looked at our bus dismissal procedures and conferred with staff about necessary changes. We are hoping that what we have put in place will help the children to feel more relaxed and will help expedite the dismissal process. We collect the data to give us an accurate picture of needed instruction and supports.



As we enter this fun season, we know that our students are excited and may need additional movement and breaks to be able to sustain their attention. Please try to keep a scheduled bedtime to help their bodies recover. All research I have read strongly suggests turning off electronic devices at least an hour before bed. Reading books in bed often helps a child unwind and have a more restful sleep.



I wish you a very happy holiday season and hope to see many of you at the PTA Auction this Friday. The event begins at 6:00 and free babysitting is available. I want to take this opportunity to thank Linda Meehan from Playmates Learning Center for providing this service, making it possible for families to attend.



From the School Counselor:

During the month of December I will be visiting the K-3 classrooms and talking with the children about feelings and empathy. December is such a hectic time for families. Besides all the regular activities it seems that there are a lot of additional happenings this time of year. It can be especially tricky for children as their routines might be changed, bedtimes may be later, relatives may be visiting or your family may be travelling. Using this month to talk about feelings may give your child additional strategies to use when feeling sad or overwhelmed. Students who accurately identify emotions tend to be less aggressive, more accepted by peers and are able to show better social skills. In addition, research shows that students who have a good understanding of their feelings do better academically. In the lessons, we will be looking at recognizing feelings within ourselves and others and paying attention to the physical clues that help us to see how

others may be feeling. When students are able to recognize feelings in others they are more likely to show empathy.

I also wanted to let parents know that I will be sending home letters regarding attendance and tardies. If your child has been absent or tardy more than 5 days we need to inform you of that. I realize many of you are aware of the number of days and the absences may be due to illness or vacation; nevertheless, the district is asking the school counselors to be in touch with parents.
