
Technology News

Curriculum Notes:

It is hard to believe the school year has come to an end! It was a year of new beginnings for each of us. Curriculum wise, we introduced new curriculum in the areas of math, English Language Arts, science and social studies. We also began using the Envisions math program. In the fall, we hosted a curriculum night. I hope to offer more of these informational evenings next year. Students in grades 3-5 participated in the Smarter Balanced assessments for the second year. We are all becoming much more comfortable with this type of computerized assessment.

Even though school is ending, it does not mean learning should stop for the summer. Students at all grade levels enjoyed using the Chromebook and tablets during the school year. Remember, if your child has access to these or a computer at home, encourage him or her to use some of programs they use at school, such as MobyMax. MobyMax may be accessed from home from any internet connected device at www.mobymax.com/nh405.

Also, we are excited that each child will be going home for the summer with a summer reading book. A committee, made up of teachers throughout the Timberlane school district, created a list of summer reading books. Our Sandown North teachers then chose the book for our students to read at each grade level. When students return, there will be some follow up activities teachers will be doing in their classrooms around the particular grade level summer reading books.

In addition, the Sandown Library offers a summer reading program. This year the theme is Ready, Set, Read. I encourage you to have your child participate. Students were introduced to the program this week during Monday Morning Meeting and heard about the numerous activities that will go along with this theme. Another program you may want to look into is STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) College for Kids.
