## **Curriculum News**

Happy New Year Sandown North Families!

As mentioned in all of our newsletters to date, the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) are being implemented over time in New Hampshire school districts. You will continue to hear more and more about the CCSS as the school year continues. District teachers and administrators are exploring and learning about the standards this year and we will move into greater usage of the standards next year. We are looking at the standards and comparing them to current practices and analyzing the materials we use to determine if they support the higher standards the CCSS requires.

To explain how the standards came to be, and some of the differences to our current NH Grade Level Expectations, a brief summary follows:

The CCSS was launched in 2009 through a partnership of the Council of Chief State School Officers and the National Governors Association. The joint effort included teachers, parents. school administrators, and experts from across International and national the country. standards, current research, and effective practices from high performing countries were used to develop the CCSS. Public input was garnered prior to publication. The final version was released in June 2010. Since then states have examined the standards, leading to adoption by the wide majority of states. Each adoption state is in the process of implementation over time.

In general, the standards are aligned with college and work expectations, are stated in clear and understandable language, include rigorous content and skill application, incorporate aspects of current state standards, and are constructed to provide students with appropriate background to compete in a global economy and society.

Expect to hear more information about the CCSS as the school district transitions to higher standards, increased evidence of each student's ability to apply their new knowledge, and ongoing analysis of best teaching practices. Please contact your school's administration with any questions you may have regarding the Common Core Curriculum State Standards.

## From the School Counselor:

Last month during my classroom guidance times, our first graders became detectives and spent time looking at large black and white pictures of children's faces. They were looking for "clues" on their faces of how the children were feeling. pictures are part of the Second Step Violence Prevention Curriculum which incorporates photographs of children and role playing to help students learn communication and conflict resolution skills. The children especially enjoy the part of the lesson where they are able to role play various scenarios. I also shared the book, "How Are You Peeling? Foods With Moods", by Saxton Freymann & Joost Students then drew their own picture of a favorite fruit or vegetable showing a particular feeling.

The 2nd graders heard the book, "The Brand New Kid", by Katie Couric. It's a story about a new student who the other students decide they don't like just because he looks different and has a different sounding name. We discussed how you cannot know what someone is like by looking at them, you need to get to know them through conversations. They then did an activity called, "the me you don't see", and drew pictures of themselves with facts that we wouldn't know by looking at them on the outside.

In 3rd grade the students watched parts of Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer. After spending several lessons prior, discussing bullying, they watched the DVD with a different point of view, noting the bullying Rudolph and Hermie had to endure.

As some of you may remember, last spring I sent home a survey regarding the school counseling program. I was pleased to get

many of the surveys returned and spent the summer reviewing data gathered. There was an interest in participating in a book study group and the topic most requested was anxiety. I will be offering a book discussion group beginning the end of January for approximately 4 weeks, ending either the week before February vacation or the week after. The book we will be reading is, "Freeing Your Child From Anxiety", by Tamar E. Chansky, Ph.D. I will be sending home an information sheet in next week's Express listing a few possible days and times. If you are interested in participating, please return the form with your choices. I am hoping to begin the week of January 28th.
