The brain needs to be challenged as does the body for peak performance. Our students will go outdoors for recess unless the weather dictates otherwise. The Timberlane nurses have a formula they use to determine if it is safe to go outdoors which includes the wind chill factor. Whenever possible, though, we do try to be outdoors so please be sure your child is dressed appropriately to be warm. Children cannot go in the snow without the proper clothing, so be sure they have snow pants, boots, mittens/gloves, and hats. We try to have a few extra mittens on hand if a child has lost one on a certain day or

forgotten them. However, we really do not want to share hats for hygienic reasons, and without a hat a child is uncomfortable outdoors. If you can spare an extra hat and set of mittens to leave at school, that might be really helpful. The children so enjoy shoveling, (yes, they do here<sup>(3)</sup>) and building snowmen and being creative in the snow!

This is a great time of year to take a close look at your child's progress in technology class. Each student has strengths to build upon and struggles to strategize for. Knowing what these strengths struggles are can help us target our support where it is most needed. Please log into Learning.com with your first, second or third grader to look at what he or she has accomplished on this program. You may also wish to check your child's progress in each of the subject areas in MobyMax. (To check MobyMax progress, click "see complete dashboard" in the green elephant button.)

The student Learning.com goals for the start of January are as follows:

Grade 1: Lessons 1-8 should be completed. (Through Shapes and Fills)

Grade 2: Lessons 1-3 and 5-7 [Through Windows and Controls (Math Video is in progress)]

Grade 3: Lessons 1-7 (Through Drill 1)

If your child has not met these goals, it would be helpful to encourage work on these lessons at home.

Home participation on MobyMax is also encouraged.

For best results, all work should be completed independently. Of course, parent encouragement and skill instruction is welcome.

Happy New Year Sandown North Families! During the first three weeks of October our grade 3 students participated in the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP). Students in grades 3-8 and in grade 11 are tested yearly in the areas of reading and math. Writing is tested in grades 5, 8, and 11, and science in grades 4, 7, and 11. The NECAP tests were designed to measure your child's progress in meeting New Hampshire's Grade Level Expectations, or GLEs. The GLEs define the knowledge and skills a student should have mastered by the end of each school year.

The New England Common Assessment Program is one of the important tools available to parents and educators to determine how well our school is helping students meet standards and grade level expectations.

Students in New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont and Maine will continue to participate in NECAP testing through the fall of 2014 or 2015. At this time, our students will be participating in the Smarter Balance Assessment, an assessment that reflects the recent adoption of the Common Core State Standards.

If your child is in grade 3, you can expect to receive his/her NECAP scores in the Sandown Express sometime before the end of February. The student results come with an interpretation guide, yet they can be difficult to understand. There are a number of us here at the school that would be very happy to discuss results should you have questions. Just give us a call!
