Curriculum Notes:

One of the things I love about working in a school is we have set beginnings and endings to the school year. The end of the school year is always an exciting time because the school community is excited to be starting summer break. However, we also feel sad as we say goodbye to our 5th graders who are moving on to the middle school. This 5th grade class is the first class to go all the way through Sandown North, from K-5. It is a special group of students and I look forward to hearing of their accomplishments as these students move through Timberlane.

In terms of curriculum work this year, we continued using the Envisions math program. Teachers noticed a difference in student understanding after students began using the Envisions program for a second year. Much of teacher professional development this year was spent looking at ways we can integrate curriculum and focus our work around competency based learning. In March, the Timberlane Parent Advisory Forum (TPAF) discussed the topic of competency based learning and reporting, updating parents on how this is being implemented in Timberlane. In order to provide information that better reflects how students are learning and being assessed, our report card is changing. Next school year, parents will be receiving a new on-line report card. Information regarding the new report card will be rolled out in the fall so that parents have the opportunity to learn and better understand how to interpret the new report card. There will be an informational brochure

as well as TPAF meetings to address parent questions. For this year's final trimester report card, parents will have the option of receiving it online but will also be receiving a hard copy.

Similar to last year, each child is being given a summer reading book. This week, our students in grades K-4 spent time as a grade level, meeting with next year's grade level teachers, hearing about expectations and receiving a copy of their summer reading book. When students return, there will be some follow up activities teachers will be doing in their classrooms around the particular grade level summer reading books.

In addition, the NH Libraries offer a summer reading program. This year the theme is Build a Better World. I encourage you to have your child participate and visit the Sandown Public Library throughout the summer.

We know how important it is for children to play outside, relax and spend quality time with friends and family during the summer, but we also know how important it is to continue reading! Research shows that children can lose one to three months of learning during the summer if they do not read on a regular basis. They can forget reading skills they have worked so hard to acquire during the school year and then have to work even harder to catch up in the fall. You can help prevent this learning loss by encouraging your children to read over the summer. Attached is a "Summer Literacy Fun Calendar" for the months July and August. There are lots of fun literacy activities for your whole family to enjoy!

In addition, a district goal is the celebration of diversity. We are inviting you to be part of this process, by sending home books, for students to read over the summer. Each grade has a specific book to read that highlights some form of diversity. This book can be read independently, or with you, if it is too challenging. Sometimes diversity can be difficult to talk about. Books

are a nice way to initiate this conversation, because the focus is on the characters and what is happening in the story. The expectation is to have all students reading their summer books so they can participate in classroom literature discussions when we return in the fall (2017-2018 school year).
