How does a school receive Title I funding?

Title I funding is based on specific federal qualifications. Schools with higher percentages of families who qualify for the free and reduced lunch program receive an annual allocation of grant funding. Applications for the Free and Reduced Lunch program are available in each school's main office.

Who is Eligible for the Title I Program?

Student selection for Title I is based on a weighed-criterion model. Each school uses multiple data points to ensure that Title I supports students based on greatest academic need. Homeless and migrant students automatically qualify for Title I services.

If my child is recommended for a Title I program, does it mean he or she is "way behind"?

No, not necessarily. Title I helps students with a wide variety of educational needs. Reading and/or Math support may be offered.

Is Title I Considered Special Education?

No, Title I is supplemental educational assistance and is aligned with our RTI (Response to Intervention) models in each school.

When and where will Title I students receive services?

Typically, Title I students receive small group instruction with a Title I tutor for apx. 30 minutes a day, 3-5 days per week. Instruction may take place within or outside of your child's classroom.



What resources are used for instruction?

The Title I tutors use a variety of materials and resources that are research-based and proven to be effective in supporting learners. Resources are generally aligned with the reading and math programs that are used in the regular classroom. The resources and materials used help to reinforce the skills that students are learning in the regular classroom while providing students with additional time and practice.

Title I Program Goals

- To increase student skills in phonemic awareness, phonics, comprehension, vocabulary, and fluency.
- To increase student skills in conceptual knowledge of numbers and computational fluency.
- Increase student achievement by providing services through the district's Response to Instruction model.
- Use data to target instruction to meet the individual needs of students.
