Winter weather is here and students continue to play outside at recess during the winter months. It is important to all staff that Pollard students continue to have fun during the winter months. Here are a few reminders to discuss with your child at home.

Dressing for Winter Fun: We do take the children out for recess unless there is a dangerously low wind-chill. Temperatures, including wind chill, are considered before sending students out to the playground for recess. When the temperature including the wind chill factor falls below 20F, students are kept indoors. Please make sure your child dresses appropriately for going outside with a coat, hat, gloves or mittens, snow pants and boots. Unfortunately, if children come Unprepared they will have to stay on the black top.



Winter Playground: The safety of your children on the playground is most important. Ice buildup can cause slippery conditions on some of the playground structures and the throwing and pushing of snow can result in unintentional injuries. We will be reminding students of ways to stay safe and still have fun in the snow.

Dear Families,

The holiday season is a great time to build literacy skills. This can be done by creating holiday learning traditions. Consider adding some new traditions for your family that will make meaningful memories and strengthen foundations for reading and learning success throughout the year. Here are a few ideas suggested by Reading Rockets.

- *Listen to audio books while you're traveling to visit family, wrapping gifts or cooking for the holidays.
- *Lyrics to holiday songs are fun to read and sing together. It is also good fun and good collaborative writing practice to make up your own lyrics to familiar tunes.
- *Start a story-telling tradition by revisiting holidays of the past. Old family photographs at holiday gatherings will help prompt stories about your own life and family traditions.
- *Put reading and writing skills to practical use. Plan holiday meals by reading cookbooks together, writing the shopping lists and finding the needed items at the store by reading signs and labels. Read the recipe and cook together. During the simmering and baking, kids can write and decorate menus or place cards for special holiday meals.
- *Set aside time just for reading. Curl up on the couch together and read aloud an old favorite or check out books about another culture's winter celebrations.
- *Work on those letters. Improve writing skills with notes or letters to relatives and friends, thanking them for their holiday gifts.

5 Effective Tips to Get Your Kids to do Chores:

Don't call them chores- instead call them responsibilities, ways to be helpful, or family contributions

Set a positive, cheerful tone- be a good example. If you grumble about your responsibilities and family contributions, children will do the same.

Set reasonable expectations. Have them do age-appropriate tasks and if you see them struggling or resisting, ask if there is some way you can help

Create visuals. If they can't read you can make a simple chart with pictures of children helping out around the house. Sometimes a step by step chart to do a task is helpful.

Offer choices- "Do you want to take out the trash or sweep the kitchen?"

Lastly- offer effective praise with emphasis on how the task they did contributed to the family.

We are accepting the change in the weather with some wintery art work. I just hung some kindergarten cardinal and pine tree paintings in the case, they are a huge hit already! Just adorable! First graders are working on hot tea or cocoa paintings. They are using only warm colors on their mug and plate, and only cool colors for their background. Second graders read the story "Old Bear" about hibernation and the seasons. They painted bears, and printed with leaves painted white to create a frosty looking background. Third graders are just starting to weave, and they LOVE it! Don't be surprised if they confiscate cardboard boxes during the holidays to make looms. They may also ask Santa for yarn! They just finished up a unit about lines. They did continuous line drawings, and blind contour line drawings, leading up to stunning drawings of a stuffed bear or bunny. Fourth graders printed winter designs with foam printing plates, this week. (They may be asking you for foam meat trays!) They took a break from a Zentangle project, and just finished a Day of the Dead oil pastel project. Fifth graders also experimented this week with printing with foam. You may get a card that they printed. They just finished an Anime self-portrait project. Their self-portraits are getting rave reviews! After vacation they will be working with chalk creating shadows in their "Snowmen at Night" drawings.

They used inquiry skills to gather information from text, and then created slideshow presentations. In technology class, they researched a specific animal from their chosen biome. In art class, all students made clay animals. Then students created wonderful models for "Animal Zoo Habitat Projects" at home.
